PREFACE

In genealogy, as in many other endeavors, there is a tendancy to eulogize the great citizens of the past. This is why we find readily available the genealogies of the majority of families that are considered noble or carry titles. What genealogist did not exert himself tracing his parentage, even if vague, to a distant cousin of an eighth generation, in order to have the pleasure to say their noble cousin So and So made a mark in the history of our land or even passed by our way.

In reality, however, the real founders of our society were, with few exceptions, humble patriots. The French that came from Quebec to Huron County can Class themselves as courageous people, who in spite of the many hardships came to cultivate and build a new way of life for themselves. None of them claimed to be heroes. They did not leave monuments commemorating their first efforts. They just accomplished their humble task of clearing the land and it is they who are the seeds of our society today. Like all seeds, some fell among thorns, some on rocks, some by the wayside, but some fell on good ground and we, the seeds of the original ancestors of Huron County, can all be proud of our heritage.

May the few comments of passing moments of these ancestors and their children be agreeable to all.

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Everyone, regardless of how unimportant he may be, should have his genealogy. Everyone should take interest and pass it on to his successors. The knowledge and the memories that came down from his ancestors are very dear and close to the heart of every man. He loves to hear recounted the experiences and happenings of his fore-fathers which, in his memories, brings them back to life. He likes to scrutinize their examples, their virtues, their labors and the small details of their existence. He keeps firmly attached to the land that his father homesteaded and to the cemeteries where rests their mortal remains. They must hold on to these memories like the fruit to the branches and the branches to the roots.

Children born of noble families are familiar with the history of their ancestors. They know well the characteristic traits of their family and their title to glory of each one of their fore-fathers. But do we not have among our ancestors some hoble fore-fathers, who, in spite of the lack of written parchment, is nonetheless worthy of nobility. They are the ones who conferred the glories of good honest labor and strong virtuous habits. It is not in honorary titles that we will have to look for the true greatness of many of our ancestors, but rather in their virtues, their strength of faith and their great courage that they manifested in coming to New France to create for themselves a domain of their liking. We will never adequately revere or remember these humble heroes, many whose names are lacking in the manuals of our history, but should be prefoundly engraved in our hearts.

We honor all these old founders of our race, men of sound heart and strong arms who chopped so much, labored so hard and so painfully. We also honor those women who had hearts of gold and silver hair, that rocked so many cradles, knotted so many fish nets, spun the wool, shuttled the looms, cried and prayed for the existence of our young country. We can salute them all without fear and with the proud gladness of being the sons and daughters of a noble race.

Let us not satisfy ourselves with stale sentiments of admiration for the heroic pioneers that were our forefathers. Rather let us study their persevering energies, their unfailing patriotism and their heroic devotion. Let us conserve the minute details of their lives so that we may determine what led them to think of what they could give to their country rather than what their country could give to them. Let us endeavor to reconstruct their train of thought from the remotest possible time and pass on the souvenirs of their deeds and our memories of them to those who will soon replace us in this world.

We make haste to gather these souvenirs of the past because many guideposts will soon be erased forever. Long ago our grand-parents and their ancestors before them lived and died within site of the Church spire that saw them born. Today it is altogether different. One by one the staunch support of the family disappears. The ancestral farm and home passes to strange hands. The youths scatter and the old folks know not in what area they will die. It is, therefore, hoped that our families, so unfortunately uprooted

from the ancestral home and tossed about by the events of the day, can carry with them a register in which will be consigned the names of those who preceded them.

It is with this thought in mind that I hope to implant among us the interest in our ancestors by very sparsely highlighting some traces they left on this continent.

It is hoped it will be of interest especially to the descendants of the early settlers of Huron County and in a more intimate way to the Denomme and Durand families and their children.

Over three hundred years have passed since these ancestors planted in the Canadian soil the families that perpetuate their names. The human chains that lead to these patriarchs already have fifteen or more links.

First of all, who were these ancestors? What was their status? What part of Europe did they come from? Why did they come to New France? All these questions are very interesting. In some cases these questions will be answered by authenticated documents. work has entailed many days of research and assistance from many relatives and friends, many of whom have been pressing for publication of my findings. To find many things about many people, and interesting events that occurred during three hundred years is one thing, but to co-ordinate, classify and put it in its proper perspective and to make it interesting, historical, factual, etc., is something else. In my limited ability, my endeavors will be directed toward the recounting of interesting details connected with some of the family names and historical events that took place during their lives in which they played a part. This will indicate that most of the families mentioned had a plebeian origin. They were common people but people that conquered the country for civilization and a Christian faith. They were brave people, martyrs, men of steel muscles with generous hearts. The blood that ran in their veins was the old Christian blood that was bathed in the faith of justice and honor.

Even if our ancestors were not heroes of the first rank, they lived a life of loyal children to their Church and their country. They have played a large part in the development of the Canadian Country by filling nobly the ungrateful task of settler, pioneer, colonist, soldier, and are, therefore, heroes.

In the course of research you come upon yellow pages of documents of which are traced the signatures of our ancestors. It is as emotional as viewing relics. It gives you great joy and happiness when you discover a choice morsel of information. It is feared that too much of this sentiment is narrated in some of the chapters, thus leaving other chapters too dry and stale, stating with complacence many of the details. Be that as it may, it is hoped that this history of our ancestors and their posterity will spread a patriotic aura capable of pardoning the imperfections of their recounting, especially to all who hold dear to their hearts, the memories of their forefathers. I feel confident you will hold, along with some of your most precious objects, this book of our ancestral family.

It will hold in its pages the veins, better yet, the arteries of a living organ. The same blood that activated so generously the hearts of our ancestors.

At night, dear readers, while sitting in your home, frequently discuss with your family your dear ancestors. Invoke the memory of your parents, your grandparents, the old time representatives of your great family. Recount their customs, their traditions, and your memories of them. Teach to your children and your grandchildren that they owe to their forefathers not only the blood in their veins and the strength in their arms but all that vibrates in their soul and especially the treasure of a Christian faith that their ancestors so jealously guarded and religiously transmitted from generation to generation. The greatest misfortune which can befall a society in the natural order is that of forgetting its forefathers.

If you find mistakes in this book, please consider that they are there for a purpose. I tried to write something for everyone, and some people are always looking for mistakes.

A big problem in tracing your genealogy is the frequent changes in the spelling of the same family name. It is easily understood when we see the different spelling of the same family name in Huron County. When our ancestors came from Quebec they were a strange prople, in a strange place with strange customs and a foreign language. Very few understood English and few Englishmen understood French. This is evident when you read the census of 1851, 1861 and 1871. The spelling of family names in some cases are unrecognizable. You find Obat for Aubin. Dasham for Ducharme. Corrivoo for Corrivou, Itchu for Etue for Hetu, Bedour for Bedard.

We must also consider that when our ancestors came from France 340 years ago there was more stress on educating a person on how to make a living than how to spell, read and write. There were no professional students. Many were artisans, masons, stone cutters, carpenters, farmers, soldiers, salt makers, weavers, boat builders, rope makers, tanners, etc., but few were scholars except the clergy and the administrators of the seigneury.

The family name as spelled in Quebec is the only spelling used in this book.

The colonisation of Canada was started, on a large scale, in the 17th century. This century in France, as well as the rest of Europe and the world, was a period of many extremes, some historically famous as well as historically infamous. This was France's greatest period according to Voltaire who claimed it was one of the world's four great ages; Pericles in Greece, Augustus in Rome and Medici in Florence. Voltaire may not be the best judge of history but there is no denying that many great things happened during that century to the world and especially to America.

This period, to a considerable extent, ordered the chaos and gave body to the visions of its predecessors. Some of the greatest representatives of science, the arts and crafts, religion and society lived in France during this century. Men like Descartes, Racine, Moliere, Cardinal Richelieu, Colbert, Louise de Marillac, St. Vincent de Paul, Cornelius Jansen, Henri de Navarre and many others.

Cardinal Richelieu who died in 1642 charted the foreign policy of France during the 30 years war. The students of history and Cardinal Richelieu can readily understand why the Pope was alledged to have said, "If there be a God, Cardinal de Richelieu will have much to answer for; if there be none, he lived a successful life."

The Protestant Reformation divided the Hapsbourg Empire but it did not succeed to permanently divide France. The Huguenot leader Henri de Navarre converted to Catholicism to become Henri IV and promised religious freedom with the Edict of Nantes. The Edict was revoked under King Louis XIV in 1683. This deprived Protestants of their civil and religious liberty and was the cause of heavy migration out of France to Switzerland, England, Germany and other countries. According to some historians, it was the beginning of the decline of France. Prior to this time King Louis XIII and Richelieu ended Huguenot migration to Canada by recalling the Recoletts and appointing the Jesuits as the religious authority in the colony in 1630.

Cornelius Jansen, Bishop of Ypres died in 1638. He was the founder of the Jansenist "Philosophy of Predestination".

Louise de Marillac - born August 12, 1591 - died March 15, 1660 was the foundress of "The Daughters of Charity" under the direction of St. Vincent de Paul. This order is still active today doing much the same works of Charity they did 300 years ago. A quote from St. Vincent de Paul to Louise de Marillac in 1630: "I don't know what spirit causes each parish in Paris to have something peculiar to itself and not want to have anything to do with the other. Each wishes to be a hodgepodge; taking something from St. Sauwer, something from our parish, St. Nicolas and something from St. Eustache". Today, with a chairman of the Liturgy commission in each parish, every lay chairman tries to outdo the chairman of the next parish. We have much of the same confusion.

During the reign of King Louis XIV, France was in a religious turmoil. The Church was closely tied to the King and was almost one with the state; the same as England. The King appointed the bishops. In 1662 Pierre de Marca was made archbishop of Paris. His philosophies were expressed in "The Harmony Between The Priesthood and the Empire" and lasted as a guideline for a long time. It was summarized by a Councillar of State as follows, "God had turned the guidance of the Church to a pilot, who is in charge of navigation and a captain who supervised the safety and the defense of the vessel. It is up to the captain to defend the ship against the enemies. He must see to it that the crew obeys the pilot, that peace and discipline are preserved. He must prevent those who act, including the pilot, from becoming careless. The pilot is the Pope, the captain is the King. By virtue of the concordat which had entrusted him with guiding the destiny of the Church, he owns, theoretically at least, everything on board ship. He chooses the bishops and distributed the abbeys, and no intermediary exists between him and God."

The 17th century is also remembered for the great architectural structures erected during this period. St. Peter in Rome was started in the 16th century and consecrated in 1626. The main floor is 650' long, the dome, 500' above the floor. It has a capacity of 87,000. It is indeed a masterpiece of architecture. The Taj Mahal was completed in 1648. It is a monument to wedded bliss which took 20,000 men two decades of labor. In Patola, capital city of Lhasa, the Palace of the gods is the residence of the Dalai Lama the spiritual leader of the Buddhist. It consists of 1400 rooms, topped by golden domes. It soars more than 440 feet and is 900 feet long. Its construction began in 1641 and was completed 50 years later. The Versailles Palace was built during the reign of King Louis XIV and accommodated the King and an army to protect him. The stables could accommodate several hundred horses. This palace was used by President Wilson to sign the Peace Treaty of the First World War.

Life in New France in the 17th Century

There were many landings on the East Coast of Canada and the United States prior to the 17th century. Verrazano explored the coast from North Carolina to Newfoundland. This was before Jacques Cartier sailed up the St. Lawrence River in 1535. In 1578 there were as many as 150 fishing vessels operating off the coast of Newfoundland. There were even a few attempts at colonization in New Brunswick and Nova Scotia prior to 1600 but they all failed until 1632.

The treaty of Ste. Germain-en-laye which was signed March 29, 1632 ceded Canada to France. Up to that time in Quebec, there were only arrivals and returns of sailors, adventurers, a few missionaries and hunters. Names of a few found in various records that indicate they were in Canada prior to 1632 are Hebert, Abraham Martin 1618, Robert Gifford 1621, Henry Pinguet, his wife, Loyce and his children Francoise, Noel and Pierre, who left France for Canada in 1634. Françoise Pinguet married Pierre De'launay, November 7, 1645. He was killed by the Iroquois about 10 years later. She remarried to Vincent Poirier. In 1634 there were about 100 colonists in Canada -- the census of 1666 nearly 6900. Prior to 1634, Quebec, and Isle of Orleans was the population center. In 1642 it extended to Three Rivers and Montreal. The census of 1666 shows the disproportion of men to women in the age group of 20 to 29. There were 78% men to 10% women. The women had no problem finding a husband and when their husbands died they were not widows for long. It was not unusual for them to marry 3 and 4 times. The marriage age of girls was 12 years and up. Little wonder that the French were known for big families. Guillemette Hebert, the daughter of one of the first colonists, married Guillaume Couillard on August 1, 1621; she was 13 years old. The wife of Samuel de Champlain, Helene Boulle, was only 11 years old when she married the founder of Quebec. He was 40. On the other hand, love was blind in regards to age in the other direction, too. The census of 1667 lists young men marrying women 20 to 30 years older than they were.

The census of 1667 reveals the different trades of the first colonists. There were many carpenters, mason bricklayers, navigators, joiners, cabinet makers, sailors, salt makers, cobblers, merchants, weavers and tailors. Others were bakers, butchers, coopers, millers, cooks and pastry makers, toolmakers, arquebus makers, rope makers, leather dressers and hatters, button makers, skid makers, brewers, cutlers, swordmakers, coal miners, tinsmiths, lathers, foundry workers, stone cutters, lathe workers. The professionals were scarce. A few were doctors, notaries, professors, printers, goldsmiths. There were also the clergy and missionaries. All colonists had to serve three years in agricultural endeavors regardless of their trade; Even the professionals were familiar with the plow, the gun, the axe and the fish net.

A colonist was expected to be able to clear lactures of land good enough to plow in one year. The average ration for the first year was 2 loaves of bread, about 6 or 7 lbs., 2 lbs. of lard, 2 oz. of butter, a little measure of oil and vinegar, a little dried cod fish, about a lb., a bowlful of peas, about a pint. All this was for 1 week. Their liquid refreshments were a pint of cider or a quart of beer per day and occasionally a drink of wine on feast days. In the winter a drop of brandy in the morning if there was any. What they could get from the country, hunting or fishing was not included. They were also advised to bring other edibles for themselves such as prunes, rice, raisins and other things that could be used for the sick. They were also advised as to clothes, blankets, a mattress and other such things that everyone could bring according to his condition and ability.

Feminine immigration to New France was started by King Louis XIV. Up to that time the colonizing was done by the recruitments of the "Associates of Notre Dame de Montreal" and other individuals. In order to promote feminine immigration, the cost of transportation and equipment (this included a dowry) was financed by the royal treasury. They were called "The King's daughters". The dowry consisted of 50 livres for a commoner who married a soldier or a colonist and 100 livres for a woman of rank who married an officer or the son of a government official. Their wardrobe, outside of their dress, consisted of the following articles: a purse, a headdress, a taffeta handkerchief, a pair of shoe ribbons, 100 needles, a comb, white thread, a pair of stockings, a pair of gloves, a pair of scissors, two knives, a thousand pins, a bonnet.

These girls received preference by the bachelors over the native-born girls on account of their dowry. So much so that Gov. Jean Talon ruled in 1672 that it wasn't proper to send any more girls to marry soldiers while the native girls were being ignored as housewives. On October 20, 1671 he passed an ordinance to force the bachelors to marry under penalty of being deprived of the privileges of fishing, hunting and the fur trade. The young men had 15 days after the arrival of the vessel carrying "The King's Daughters" in which to pick a prospective bride. Otherwise the bachelors would lose their hunting license.

Some historians refer to "The King's Daughters" as "Daughters of pleasure" but thanks to the minute research by reknown historians the title did not apply. True, it could be said some were shiftless, others rude of manner, but most were equal to the task of the day and proved to be good companions, courageous and sometimes heroic. The descendants of Huron County settlers that can claim "King's Daughters" as their ancestors are Mousseau - Jacques - a recruit of 1653, married Marguerite Sauviot September 16, 1658. Ducharme - Fiacre - also a recruit of 1653 married Marie Pacreau June 13, 1659. Durand - Jean - was engaged to Marie Fayette on October 3, 1661 but the marriage contract was broken before the wedding took place. All these girls were "King's Daughters". (Prime Minister Trudeau's maternal ancestor was Catherine de Lavaud, a "King's Daughter".)

The medium of exchange for the early settlers was mostly beaver furs and eels, except for the land owner or leaser. If he did any cultivating he paid his rent and merchandise in wheat, butter or lumber which he cut as his farm expanded. The eels were so plentiful that one fisherman with good equipment could catch from forty to seventy thousand pounds during the months of September and October. A comparison of services to money is listed as follows:

One bushel of wheat was worth 3 to 8 livres.

One hundred boards, 10 feet long 10 inches wide and one inch thick was worth 50 livres.

Butter was 12 to 17 sous.

A beef ready to butcher was 200 livres.

A pig ready to butcher was 50 livres.

A day's work, no hours mentioned, 1 to 2 livres.

Workers by the year received from 50 to 180 livres.

The colonists had to contend with raids by the Indians. It was very dangerous to go to work in the fields, the lumber camps or fishing boats. The comen lived in constant fear that when their husbands left for work they would never return. In the spring of 1661 which was the worst period, the records indicate that one hundred Frenchmen were killed by the Indians.

In plain words, when the French came to Canada the Indians' only thought was to live. They are so as not to die; they covered themselves to keep off the cold, not for appearance. The French, in various stages, found food then seasoning, they covered themselves against the severity of the weather, then added grace and beauty. Houses were made simple, just to be used; later they were made to be seen. Men perfected themselves little by little, necessity marching on ahead, politeness and gentleness following after, and knowledge bringing up the rear.

The first detailed writings of Canadian History was made by Jesuit missionaries and is known as the <u>Jesuit Relations</u>. These writings are like a diary of the year-to-year life of these dedicated priests. It describes the life-style of the Indian, their diet, their dress, their morals, etc. It details the problem they had trying to understand and make themselves understood by the Indians. Several young Indians were sent to France to learn the French language so that they could be used as interpretors for them and teach them the Indian dialects. They describe the cruelties of the Indians towards their captives thether they were fellow Indians or French. There are many volumes of these Jesuit Relations, all of them very interesting to the historians of early Canada.

In the <u>Jesuit Relations</u> of 1634 Fr. LeJeune writes of labor problems of the colonists.

- 1. It is the nature of working people to complain and grumble.
- 2. The difference in wages makes them complain; a carpenter, a bricklayer and others earn more than laborers and yet they do not work so much. They do not consider that a master mason may exert himself less than a laborer, although he earns more.
- 3. The greater part do not follow their trade except for a short time. A tailor, a shoemaker, a gardener, and others are amazed when required to drag some wood over the snow; besides they complain that they will forget their trade. Today it is called "working off code" and can be a cause for a strike.

The colonist built his own house. These were made big enough to house their families which were ordinarily quite large. were patterned after the houses in Normandy, the inner walls white-washed with lime and the outer walls stained red. The out buildings were grouped a short distance from the house. This consisted of a barn with a thatched covered roof, storage bins for grain and a pit for winter storage of roots. Not far from the house they built a thick oven of brick and clay where they did their baking of bread, etc. (Joseph and Julienne Durand had one of these ovens on the ancestral home at Cinq Gerlo two miles north of Drysdale.) The homes had a large fireplace, furnished with pot hooks and andiron. The family table, the flour bin (huche), the bucket bench, the cradle, spinning wheel, the weaving loom, the long bench along the table, some wooden chairs, trimmed with rawhide, completed the furnishings of the living room. There were also a few holy pictures hung on the walls, generally of the "Holy Family". The wide floor boards were covered with rag rugs and carpets woven or crocheted by the grandmother. The bedroom had a high poster bed, a heavy chest of drawers in which was stored all the linens, etc. Imported merchandise and furniture was very expensive, consequently the colonists in a large part supplied their own wants. Their necessities made them industrious, versatile in their ability to meet all their most urgent needs, and masters of all trades. All their furniture was hand made, including the cart and the carriage. The wife occupied herself with the care of the home. She could tailor the clothes, sew, stitch, dye, wash, iron, prepare the yeast and bake the bread which was always excellent. In the summer she found time to take care of a garden and at times even help with the harvest in the fall. She knew how to wield the scythe and the rake. In the winter, sitting by her spinning wheel, she would hum a song from France to the baby in the cradle nearby; she spun the yarn or chased the bobbin on the weaving loom. In all seasons, she found time to knit stockings, mitts, sweaters and shawls, to braid straw hats and to hand make all the clothes for the family. While making a living for a large family was a full-time job, they did

get some help from the Government. Family Support is nothing new. On April 5, 1669 Colbert announced a decree which read "Desiring the inhabitants of Canada participate in the graciousness of His Majesty the King to his people in consideration of large families to help them until they are married, His Majesty has ordered and is ordering that in the future the inhabitants of the Country that have up to ten living children, born from a legitimate marriage, that are neither priest, brother or nun, will be paid a gratuity that will be sent to said country, a pension of 300 livres per year and to those having twelve 400 livres." (Chapais-Talon p. 313)

The faith of our ancestors was the source of their strength and consolation. They were content to live that great life and left it to others to explain it. The thought of God dominated their lives. Prayers were said in common marning and night, the family rosary was recited daily. At the sound of the church bell, everyone stopped and recited the Angelus, including those in the streets of Quebec and Montreal. As late as 1947 while touring in Quebec you could hear the radio broadcast the resary every day.

Our ancestors manifested their faith at all times and on all occasions. They strictly observed all the feast days of the Church; they assisted at Rogation days, the masses for the fruits of the earth, the devotions to the May of the Cross, the public exercises during the month of May to the Blessed Virgin, etc. They kept their eyes and thoughts elevated towards Heaven while their hands were busy toiling on earth.

Some of the religious traditions of our aucestors who didn't possess the sense of the geniuses but whose humble faith enlightened their supernatural instructions, were brought with them to Huron County. The sign of the Cross preceded their every act. There are a few American League ball players today who, when they come to bat, make the sign of the Cross. It was a common practice in all sports at the University of Ottawa in 1920 where there were many French students. Many of us can remember when our fathers got on their knees, blessed themselves, before starting their first chore, at the completion of an important task, before felling a tree or cutting the head off the rooster for the Sunday dinner. The mother also blessed herself before starting the day's wash, before putting the dough in the oven or mounting a piece on the weaving loom. Grace before and after meals was never forgotten. Before cutting the first slice of bread, the sign of the Cross was made on it with the knife, to pay homage to Divine Providence that provided his daily bread.

The cross at the road was honored by our ancestors by the men lifting their hats in salute and the nomen and children blessing themselves. Many of these crosses are still at many crossroads in Quebec today. In May, the month of Mary, people would travel towards the cross saying the rosary aloud as they went. When they arrived they would sing hymns, recite the evening prayers before leaving for home. If there was an unusually hig invasion of

grasshoppers or a long dry spell or wet spell that endangered their crcps, they went to the crossroads and prayed with gusto. The palm or cedar branches that were blessed on Palm Sunday were placed in all the rooms of the house. When there was a wake a sprig of palm was used to sprinkle holy water on the corpse. Every home had blessed candles and holy water. The candles were lit and holy water was sprinkled in every room during a severe electrical storm. If the storm was in the night the children were all brought together and the litany to the Blessed Mother was recited. It was very touching to see the master of the house on New Year's morning give his solemn blessing to each one of his children individually. This custom was prevalent in Huron County among the French families. Only a catastrophe could prevent them from attending Mass on Sunday. Those too sick or crippled to attend Mass spent an hour in silence at home during the time the Mass was being said. It they could read they followed the liturgical prayers in their missal. In the afternoon if they could not attend Vespers they recited the rosary at home while this office was going on in Church. When danger of death approached, arrangements were made to bring the priest with the Holy Eucharist. This required two vehicles. There was always a neighbor ready and glad to assist on such occasions. The ringing of a bell signalled the time of departure from the Church. The priest rode in the rear vehicle with the driver holding a lantern in front of his chest, replacing the sanctuary lamp. The front carriage ringing a little bell when he approached anyone was the signal of the passage of Our Lord, and they knelt and bowed their heads in respect. When the priest entered the home of the sick everyone knelt and all answered the liturgical prayers for the sick. The intensity of the faith of our ancestors inspired great confidence in the priest. He was respected and obeyed. He shared their sorrows, their fears and worries and their joys. He was the counselor of their souls and their hearts, a medicant, an advocate lawyer or caretaker of their last wishes. After being a friend and a guide to each one during his life, the priest assisted him during his last moments with the consolation of his Holy Office smoothed their passage from this life to eternity. The funeral was not an occasion for a great oration, like at the grave of the mighty, but there was regret in all the hearts, a sincere praise on all the lips and a faithful souvenir of the departed. Like Louis Alexander said:

"Beloved dead, you have faithfully served God and your country, and you have been the honor of the family. Now rest yourself in death without regrets, in the shadow of the Cross and your laurels like the builder at the end of a full and laborious day. May not the remembrance of your virtues remain buried with you in your sombre grave. May they, on the contrary, like a heacon, light our gloom like a strong force to carry us in our failures, and like a loving voice give us courage to follow in your footstens."

The assets of a colonist in the 17th century after living a long life working from sunrise till sunset was very minimal as compared with the assets of an average nerson in the 20th century. An illustration is the inventory of as ets of Louis Durand, the son

of the first Canadian-born Durand colonist, who was a successful "Coureur de Bois", fur trader, farmer, soldier and public official at one time or another during his life. Suffice it to say he led what would be considered today as a much varied successful private and public life. The inventory of his worldly goods when he died around 1740 after marrying the 2nd time and being the father of lachildren is as follows:

a hammer 4 pairs of hinges a stepladder a red copper pail 10 bushels of wheat an old frying pan an iron kettle 5 old plates a gun and powder horn l bowl a salt box 6 spoons a steel strong box a flat iron an iron stand an old plough shore & chain a 3-year old cow an old scythe and cradle an 8-month old pig a big plane a pair of grooving planes for a sport coat & belt a wool card planks a spinning wheel a pair of grooving planes for a logging chain boards two moulding planes a mare 4 sheep concave-convex moulding plane a rabbit finishing plane 1 cow 4 books 2 pigs a marking gauge or scriber a wooden bucket a hoe a clamp a mortise chisel an old ax 3 drill bits a grid iron a compass a work bench

One aspect of life in the early 17th century that strikes anyone researching their ancestry was the ability of the early settlers to travel so extensively. When you consider their only means of travel was an oar and a canoe, a pair of snow shoes and moccasins, it is unbelievable the distances they went during the course of just plain making a living. However, when you consider that furs and the fur trade was to them what the automotive industry is to us today it helps to understand the necessity for them to travel. By the way, it is interesting to note that the first horse brought to Canada was a gift of the inhabitants to the Governor, Mr. de Monmagny in 1647. On July 16, 1665 a ship unloaded its cargo which consisted of 12 horses and other farm animals for the colonists. Samuel de Champlain founded Quebec in 1608, so it was 57 years before any real help in the line of transportation started to take root and many more years before very many had a horse.

The fur trading routes were numerous. The first routes originated from Quebec, later from Batiscan, then Montreal. The main routes went up the St. Lawrence River to Ville Marie, now Montreal. Up the Ottawa River to Lake Nippissing, the French River to Georgian

Bay to Michillimackinac Island. This was the stronghold that controlled the fur trade. A fort was built and it became the trading center for the Indians from the south and the west. The "coureur de bois" established fur routes that branched out from this fort as far as the Mackenzie and Peace River in the North West and the Gulf of Mexico to the South. The sites of these fur trading posts in some areas have been restored as a project for the Centennial Celebration and are being used as tourist attractions. These routes were travelled by our ancestors without compass or geographical maps that we have today. Today if you were to ask a group of school children if they had ever seen a pair of snow shoes, less than 1% would raise their hand, while if you asked how many have had a ride in a snowmobile, about 90% would have their hand up. Both are means of transportation on snow only 300 and some years apart.

The family names of some of our Huron ancestors appear in the pages of history in many different parts of the country. <u>Jean Marie dit Ducharme</u> was a navigator, born in 1680, a lieutenant of his brother Jacques Francois, when he seized two English ships in 1712.

Jacques Francois was the commander of the privateer "LaTrempeur". They left on a cruise May 14, 1712, against the enemies of the State. The crew consisted of one Frenchman from Quebec, 6 Acadian French pirates, 1 Irishman and 2 Indians. The English ships that were abandoned to them during the chase were "La Mutine" and "Le Gaillard". The pirates took the two ships back to Quebec and sold their contents at auction. This brought them 6,820 livres.

There is another mention of a Jean Marie Ducharme (could be a descendant) in a book by John Anthony Caruso, The Mississippi Valley Frontier. The Governor of Canada in 1773 assigned Patrick Sinclair, Lt. Governor of Mackinac, the campaign against St. Louis. At a portage between the Fox and the Wisconsin River, through the influence of Jean Marie Ducharme and Joseph Calve, another French fur trader from Quebec, they collected 750 Indians. Jean Marie Ducharme was delighted to lead these Indians against St. Louis. In 1773 he had as a Eritish subject engaged in illicit fur trade in Spanish territory. The Spanish had caught up with him and confiscated his furs. His crafty appeals to the Indians were successful. In return for promises of pay and the prospects of plunder they agreed to fight for the British. He promised his fur-trading buddles, "All the traders who will secure the nosts on the Spanish side of the Mississippi during the next winter, the exclusive trade of the Missouri during that time." He gained support of Matchikuis, great chief of the Cttawas, hy conferring on him the title of general, permitting him to wear a scarlet coat with epaulets like that of any commissioned British officer. He gave him command of all the Indians. The attack against St. Louis failed.

Elisabeth LaPorte - Louis Riel's name may not ring a bell to any Huron County residents, but to anyone French, Irish or English living west of Sault Ste. Marie, Manitoba, Alberta or Saskatchewan and is familiar with the history of the Canadian west, will readily recognize the name of Louis Riel. A monument in his honor was recently erected in Regina. He is known in history as the father of Manitoba. He died in jail as a rebel. He rebelled against the injustices towards the Metis and Indians during his lifetime. He was a direct descendant of Jean Baptiste Riel and Marguerite Boucher, the daughter of Louis Boucher and a Chippewa Indian who married about 1812, probably at Ille-a-la-Cross, Saskatchewan. His grandfather was Jean Baptiste Riel who married Marie Antoinette H enault, daughter of Pierre and Genevieve Charon Ducharme. His grandfather was Jean Baptiste Riel who married Marie Charlotte Sylvestre, daughter of Nicolas Sylvestre and Marie Elisabeth LaPorte, on February 16, 1721 at St. Sulpice, Quebec. She was the daughter of Louis and Madeleine Mousseau. Louis LaPorte was the son of Jacques and Nicole Duchesne who married January 30. 1695.

Shortly after the founding of Montreal, then Ville Marie, it became necessary for Maisoneuve to return to France to recruit men to come back with him to defend Montreal against the attacks of the Iroquois Indians. He left in the fall of 1651 and returned two years later. One-hundred fifty-three signed up for 3 to 5 years service in Canada. Their wages depended on their trade. Of these, 50 changed their minds and did not leave France. It was a six- to eight-week journey. They set sail June 20, 1653 on the good ship "St. Nicolas de Nantes". Eight died on the high seas. Out of the 95 that were left, 24 were massacred by the Iroquois, 4 accidentally drowned, 1 died in a fire of his home. This leaves 49 who left male or female posterity. Two family names in Huron County, descendants of these ancestors, are Ducharme (Fiacre) and Mousseau (Jacques).

The fur traders - In 1670 the French Government required fur traders to have a license. Their license specified the number of canoes which each holder could take on his expedition, his route and the number of employees. The employees were the French "Coureur de bois" and Indians. The license described their duties to prevent unlicensed men from joining the expedition. The fur trader was required to carry in each canoe a specified amount of merchandise from the King to the commander of the fort, a trading post or a missionary. The license placed each employee under contract with the voyageur, who agreed to make his journey and return for a specified amount of pelts. Every "Coureur de bois" usually made his last will and testament before leaving. This included arrangements with the merchants to provide credit for his family until his return. Characters connected with the fur trade were:

<u>Voyageur</u> - Most of his time was spent on lakes and rivers. He could paddle his cance 15 to 18 hours a day for weeks on end. He could carry merchandise at the portages 2 and 3 times his weight.

Mangeur de lard (Pork eaters) - He acquired this name because he was fed on his route, from the start of his journey to the trading post, mostly on pork, hard tack and pea soup. He was not accustomed to the hardier fare of bear grease, lard and lyed corn which was the voyageur's fare. He was more or less serving his apprenticeship to become a voyageur. This took about five years.

Hivernant (winterer) - He was an old hand at the trade and spent his winters at the post and the far interior, exchanging trade goods for furs, under the direction of the Commis, or clerk.

Commis (clerk) - He was in command of the Hivernant and was serving his apprenticeship to become
a bourgeois. His job was the most exacting of any
that pertained to the fur trade. It sometimes
became necessary to take his merchandise to some
Indian Lodge and live with the chief until all
was traded. The Indians warmed their residences
with a fire in the middle of the floor, venting
the smoke through a hole in the middle of the
wigwam.

A Council for Peace

In the 17th century when various Indian tribes met in council to negotiate a peace treaty, they did so by offering presents as tokens, and in so doing explained the significance of each by very touching expressions, from the bottom of their hearts. An example of such a council between the Iroquois and Hurons and Algonquins -- the ambassador of the Iroquois is first to present his gifts:

First - "You have wept too much; it is time to wipe away the tears shed so plentifully by you for the death of those whom you have lost in war. Here is a handkerchief for that purpose.

Second - "Wipe away the blood which had crimsoned mountains, lakes and rivers, and which was crying for vengeance against those who had shed it. Here is another handkerchief for this purpose.

Third - "I wrest from your hands, hatchets, bows and arrows, and to strike the evil at its roots, I take away all thoughts of war from your hearts." He offers another token for this nurpose. (They, believed that sadness, anger and all violent passions expel the rational soul from the body which, meanwhile, is animated only by a sensitive soul which we have in common with animals.)

Fourth token was to restore the rational soul to the seat of reason.

Fifth - a medicinal draught to expel from their hearts all bitterness, gall and bile with which they might still be irritated.

Sixth was to open their ears to the words of truth and the promises of a genuine peace, in the knowledge that passion stupefies and blinds those who yield to it.

Seventh, to give assurance that the four upper Iroquois nations were peacefully inclined, and that their hearts would never be divided.

Another token was a May tree to be erected that was so high that it reach the sky. They meant this to be the centre of the peace, and the place of general reunions. The reason for its height was so that all the nations, even those from a distance, could see it and come to it. The purpose of the ninth present was to fix a sun high in the heavens above this May tree so as to shine straight down upon it and admit no shadow, in order that all councils held and treaties concluded there might take place, not in obscurity of the night, but in open day, lighted by the sun, which sees all things and has only abhorrence for treasonable plots, which court darkness.

The Wampum Belt Formula

The speech delivered at a council to welcome an ambassador from a distant tribe:

"Brothers, with this belt I open your ears that you may hear. I remove grief and sorrows from your hearts. I draw from your feet the thorns that have pierced them on your journey hither. I steep the seats about the council fire that you may sit at ease. I wash your heads and bodies that you may be refreshed. I console with you on the loss of your friends who have died. I wipe out any blood that may have been spilt between us."

The first cast-iron stove was manufactured in Lynn, Massachusetts in 1642. One hundred years later Benjamin Franklin invented the stove that carries his name. In 1800 Isaac Orr manufactured the first round cast-iron stove with grates. In 1833 Jordan A. Mott invented the base burner stove which could use anthracite. In 1840 Robert Briggs began the first installation of hot water heating. It wasn't until the 1930's that gas and oil enabled the ordinary householder to throw away the coal shovel. Already these are being sold as antiques, especially the cinder sifter shovel which many young people today could not identify its use.

The first beer made in Canada was at Sillery, Quebec in March of 1647.

The first marriage in the Colony of French Canada was between Guillaume Couillard and Guillmet Hebert in July 1620.

ORIGIN OF SOME HURON COUNTY ANCESTORS

- Michel Aubin Born 1638, son of Jacque and Jacqueline Cornilleau of Taurouvre, Orne, France. Married at Ste. Famille, Isle of Orleans, Quebec, June 11, 1670 to Marie Prevost, widow of Marice Berthelot. He bought a farm from Charles Lauzon of Isle of Orleans on September 6, 1664.
- Isaac Bedard Born 1616 in Paris, France. Married March 20, 1644 at La Rochelle, France to Marie Gerard, born 1621. He came to Canada in 1661 with his son Jacques. His wife and another son, Louis, joined them two years later. He was a master carpenter. He bought a farm near Charlesbourg, Quebec in 1666. He died January 15, 1689. Etienne, a descendant of Isaac, married April 19, 1694 at Charlesbourg to Marie-Jeanne Villeneuve (Mathurin & Marguerite LeMerche). Her brother, Jacques Villeneuve was the direct ancestor of His Eminence Cardinal Rodrique Villeneuve.
- Gaspard Boucher Came to Canada in 1635 with his wife Nicole Lerner and five children. He was born at Notre Dame de Mortagne, Perche, France. He lived in Quebec for a while then bought a farm of 84 acres at Three Rivers, Quebec.
- <u>Pierre Boucher (Gaspard and Nicole Lerner) Governor of Three</u> Rivers in 1653 - 58. He went to France in the autumn of 1661, delegated by the habitants, and with the approval of D'Avangour to represent the needs and the dangers of the Colony and ask substantial aid from the government for its protection and development. Louis XIV had recently lost his Prime Minister, Mazarin, by death; and now the King was disposed to govern his realm in person. He was surprised at the information given by Boucher of the resources, advantages, and possibilities of Canada; and made plans to place the colony under the direct control of the crown, and to give it material aid. Accodingly, he sent back with Boucher, a hundred soldiers, and an officer named Dumont, who was ordered to examine and report the actual condition of the Colony. Boucher also engaged 200 colonists in France who returned with him. (1662) During the following year, in accordance with the King's request, he wrote his little book, dit. Vrit. et Mat. de la Neuvelle France published in Paris in 1664. Sulte claims that the circulation of this book was promptly suppressed by interests, who for their own profit, wished that Canada remain a wilderness.
- Rene Brisson Born 1635 at LaRochelle, France. Married September 6, 1664 at Quebec to Anne Vizina (Jacques & Marie Boidon of La-Rochelle, France). On May 4, 1689 he signed a contract to go up the Ottawa River along with Louis Dupuis, Jacques Eitier and Joseph Goulet. They went as far as Michilimackinak.
- Nicolas Cantin (Quentin) dit LaFontaine, born 1633 son of Louis and Marie Des Mousseau of Gonnville sur Honfeur, France. Married at Quebec August 3, 1660 to Madeleine Roulais (Michel & Jeanne Malin).

Mathieu Choret (now Charette) - Born 1624, son of Mathieu & Jeanne Serre of LaRochelle, France. Married March 4, 1647 at LaRochelle to Sebastienne Veillon (Maixent & Bernarde Vinet).

Etienne Corriveau (François & Marguerite Besnard of Fontclaireau-Angoulieme, France) - Born 1643, married at Ste. Famille, Isle of Orleans, Quebec, October 28, 1669 to Catherine Bureau (Born 1651 to Jacques & Marguerite Verrier of Paris).

Claude Delaunay (now Denomme) (Simon & Jeanne Celier) Born 1631 at St. Jean du Rauvray - Picardie, France. Came to Canada 1666. Married 1669 at Ste. Famille, Isle of Orleans, Quebec to Denyse Leclerc (Jean & Jeanne Nigremont of Notre Dame de Gometz, Paris, France). He was a ropemaker. He bought a farm on the Isle of Orleans, Quebec. He is the ancestor of all the Denommes of Huron County, Ontario.

Fiacre Ducharme dit LaFontaine - Born 1623. Son of Tousant and Jacqueline DeRoy of Paris. He came to Canada as a recruit to defend Montreal in 1653 (La Grande Recrue). He was a joiner carpenter by trade and was hired at 100 livres per year for five years. He decided to remain in Canada and on January 13, 1659 he married, at Ville Marie, Marie Pacrau, daughter of Jacques and Debra Ballet from Critel, Parish of Xaintes in Sainte Onge, France. In 1663 he enlisted in the Militia of Ste. Famille as a corporal of the 18th squad. The 1666 census lists he and his wife both 36 years old, having two sons. On August 28, 1657 he purchased a site of one acre on which there was a house which was called Vidbouteille (empty bottle). Everything, including the seignory rights, totalled 400 livres. On October 15, 1674 he purchased 60 acres at La Prairie de Madeleine. He died at Montreal, March 17, 1677. His wife remarried February 14, 1678. His oldest son, Louis, was killed in action fighting the English, August 16, 1691. Claude, another son, was killed by the Iroquois, June 7, 1691. He had three other children.

Pierre Charron Ducharme - Pierre & Judith Martin from the Parish of St. Martin, Meaux, France) Born 1640, married at Montreal, Quebec October 19, 1665 to M. Catherine Pillard (Pierre & Marguerite Maulinet, Parish of N. D. de Cogne-LaRochelle, France). He died December 26, 1700. Catherine died July 2, 1717 at Montreal.

Jean Durand (Louis & Madeleine Malvande of Doeuil sur le Mignon, Ste. Onge, France). Born 1636. Came to Canada 1656. Married 1662 at Quebec City to Catherine Annonnontak (Born 1648) daughter of Nicolas Arendanki & Jeanne Otri-ho-Andet from Huron Mission. He was a farmer, died in 1671. Catherine remarried June 28, 1672 to Jacques Couturier and lived on a farm at Cap-rouge, Quebec. She died 1709.

Nicolas Geoffroi - Born 1715 son of Nicolas and Nicole Mercier,
Parish of St. Pierre, Dampierre-en-Champagne, France. He married
at Lavaltrie, Quebec, November 1742 to Marguerite Griveau de
Boisjoly. (She died August 9, 1761) He married again June 6,
1763 to Marie Frappier dit Bonterre. He moved to Berthier around
1772 where he died December 9, 1779. He came to Canada on the ship
"Le Rubis" which sailed from La Rochelle, France June 10, 1740.

He was a foundry worker. He had 12 children from his first wife and six from his second wife.

Etienne Gelinas - Born 1624. His grandfather was born 1559, died 1638 and was a farmer at St. Onge, France. Etienne's wife Huguette Robert died before he came to Canada with his son who was 12 years old. They came on the Corvette "LeTaureau" in May 1658. He married the second time October 12, 1682 at Pointe Aux Trembles, Quebec to Marguerite Benoit. His son, Jean, on orders of Governor Frontenac, accompanied Pierre Lesueur along with Joseph Charbonneau, Nicolas Lemoyne and others on a trading mission to the Sioux country in 1693. Jean married October 17, 1667 at Cap-de-la-Madeleine to Francoise Charmenil (Julien de Chamenil & Julienne Berce of Mans, France. There are three Gelinas family names originating with this ancestor. Etienne married to Huguette Robert is the ancestor of the Gelinas. Jean Baptiste married to Jeanne Boissoneau is the ancestor of the Gelinas dit Bellmare. Pierre married to Madeleine Bourbeau is the ancestor of Gelinas dit LaCourse.

Thomas Hayot (now Ayotte) The Parish registry of Quebec indicates his presence in the country on October 30, 1638. He came from St. Jean de Mortagne, Perche, France. He married on July 15, 1629 to Jeanne Boucher. He came to Canada with his wife and three children. He married the second time September 8, 1670 to Marthe Raudy (a King's Daughter). (Nicholas Raudy and Anne Bodol).

George Hety (Jean & Clair Cordier) born 1665 in Rouyen, N. D. du Havre, Normandy, France. He was a master cooper, came to Canada as a soldier in the company of Nicolas Deneau in July 1685. Married February, 1699 at Boucherville, Quebec to Marie Loiseau (Lucas & Francoise Cure from France). He died September 2, 1747 at St. Sulpice, Quebec. Marie died at Lavaltrie, Quebec May 18, 1726.

Pierre Masse - Born 1620, married May 15, 1644 to Marie Pinel de la Chaisney (Nicolas & Madeleine Miranda). Nicolas Pinel and a son Gille were massacred by the Iroquois. His widow sold the farm to Jean Durand the ancestor of the Huron County Durands.

Jacques Mousseau dit Laviolette - Son of Nicolas and Jacqueline
Jannot from Aze-le-Rideau-Tours, France. Born 1628, came to
Canada in 1653 with "La Grande Recrue" to defend Montreal against
the Iroquois. He became a homesteader and was paid 75 livres per
year. On August 20, 1655 he obtained a concession of land. On
September 16, 1658 at Ville-Marie he married Marguerite Sauviot de
Tours, daughter of Jean Sauviot dit Lavergne and Louise Brodeur.
On February 19, 1661 his name is registered as a pit sawyer. In
the 17th century before saw mills existed, the rude trade of pit
sawyer was in great demand and highly appreciated. A pit was dug
the log laid over the pit, one man in the pit and the other above
using a cross-cut saw, sawed the trees into heavy timbers, boards,
etc. These were used to build houses, barns, bridges, etc. In
1663 he joined the militia of Ste. Famille as a soldier of the 12th
squad. The census of 1666 for Montreal shows Jacques, 35, Marguerite
23, his wife. Francoise 7, Marie 5, and a later census shows

Marguerite Perin 3, and Jacques 1. He had six acres under cultivation. The census of 1681 at Repentigny shows Jacques Mousseau 50, Marguerite Sauviot, his wife, 40, children - Perine 17, Jacques, 15, Elisabeth 15. 1 gun, 1 cow, 4 acres under cultivation. The last trace of him is May 28, 1692 - Jacques Mousseau farmer of Boucher-ville, hired his daughter Elisabeth to Rene Fezeret, husband of Marie Cartier, for one year "to serve them to the best of her ability in all things she will be judged as capable of doing."

Samuel Papineau - (Samuel and Marie Delain) Born 1636 in Poitou, France. He was a soldier, arrived at Quebec 1688, served under Frontenac. On June 6, 1704 he married Catherine Quevillon. She had been carried off by the Iroquois and ransomed after several years. They had nine children. She married four times and died at the age of 95 in 1781. Samuel was buried April 23, 1737 at Sault-au-Recollet.

Huron County

Many of the French families that settled in Huron County came from Joliette, Berthier, L'Assomption, Et. Thomas, Ste. Elisabeth and some from Levis.

Huron County was a part of lands surrendered by the Chippewa Indians to the Government in 1825. The Canada Land Company was formed and land was advertised for colonization a few years later. Very few colonists were in the area prior to 1946. The census of 1846 shows the population as follows:

Hay Township 113

Stanley Township 737

Stephen Township 213

Prior to this period, as early as 1830, records indicate there were French lumberjacks practicing their skills in the forests of Huron County. Among them the names of Baptiste Durand, Claude Gelinas, Abraham Bedard and Norbert Denomme appear. They were the first to bring a group of people from Quebec and founded a settlement on the shores of Lake Huron. They called it "Pounte aux Bouleau" -- the lake shore of Lot 3 now Darle Rau's farm. The principal reason for them to come to Huron County was a succession of crop failures of almost famine proportion between 1840 and 1850.

The route taken by the migrants, after they reached Quelph, was by a road that the Canada Land Company had cut through the forest connecting Quelph to Goderich. In 1946 there were stage coaches run every day between Hamilton and Quelph and three times a week to Goderich. The fares were: Galt to Hamilton \$1.00, to Quelph \$.75, to Goderich \$4.00. It was a six-day trip from Quelph to Stratford, to Hunter's Corner, now Seaforth, and Edmondville, then to Goderich. Some travelled by cx cart with all their belong-Some came by water to Goderich. The agent at Trescort forwarded them to Port Dalhausie, then to Fort Erie. From there they were forwarded to Detroit. They then proceeded by smaller steam boat up the Detroit River through Lake St. Clair, to Port Huron or Sarnia. From there the Canada Land Company would transport them by boat to Goderich. This route appeared in an advertisement in "The Canadian Immigrant" Sandwich Upper Canada, December 1, 1831. Some of the early settlers came by boat to Hamilton, then on foot or stage coach to Galt, then to Stratford, to Seafcrth, to Brucefield, to Kippen then to the shores of Lake Huran. Railroad service was established from Toronto to Stratford on Cotober 18, 1356. The London Huron & Bruce rail line was completed in 187. Today it is a freight line. Railroad service was established to London and St. Marys in 1351 and to Sarnia in 1359. A letter taking 10 days from Montreal to Sarnia in 1853 took only 29 h urs in 1854, today, 1975, just a few hours by air. Blake became a post office in December 1863.

Drysdale 1873. Johnson's mill, now St. Joseph, in 1871, Zurich 1856. The first international railway tunnel in the world connected Sarnia and Port Huron in 1891. This linked Montreal and Toronto to Chicago. This tunnel was declared an historic site in 1963. The Blue Water Bridge connecting Sarnia to Port Huron was approved for traffic on Labor Day 1938. (I drove across that day and had to line up about 1/2 mile.)

Some historians claim that the French settlers that came from Quebec were more interested in fishing than farming. It is true, many of them practically lived on fish and pea soup for some time after arriving from their long journey. A research of the land titles reveals many ancestral names as being the name on deeds granted by the Canada Land Company.

Lot 5 - Lake road west now owned by Raymond Denomme and Tony Rau was sold to Antoine Cantin February 6, 1857 by the Canada Land Company. He sold 70 acres to his two sons, Achille (married to Caroline La Porte) and Pierre (married to Mathilda Masse). According to the 1871 census both were married in Quebec. After Pierre died, his wife mortgaged the farm to John Campbell who acquired it through notice of sale on March 12, 1906. Maxime and Philip Denomme bought it on May 6, 1906 for \$2400.00. Maxime sold his share to Philip in May 1906. Raymond acquired it May 6, 1948.

Lot 6 - Lake shore west - $50\frac{1}{2}$ acres north $\frac{1}{2}$ (now owned by Tony Rau). The Canada Land Company sold this to Gregoire Gratton on February 24, 1856. He sold it to Louis Denomme, my grandfather, on January 21, 1878. It was sold to his two sons, Maxime, my father, and Philip for \$2550.00 on May 24, 1898. Philip sold his half to Maxime for \$1275.00 on December 6, 1908. Two years later Maxime sold it to Charles Bedard on October 19, 1910. It was sold to Theodore La Porte Movember 20, 1945. He subdivided the lake shore property and sold the balance to Tony Rau on March 25, 1967. The log house in which I was born was torn down and rebuilt in a pioneer village near London.

Lot 7 - Lake shore rest 50; acros bouth ½ (now owned by Isadore Ducharme). Canada Land Company sold it Shaumire on March 17, 1856 acquired by Norbert Denomme December 22, 1894. Sold to his son Pierre on May 6, 1903. After he died his widow Victorine sold one acre to her son Francois December 3, 1945. Alfred the son of Francois now lives on the 1-acre lot.

Mhen the settlers arrived from Quebec, their concern was to find a place to live. They bought land from the Canada Land Company for about \$2.50 per acre. Bost of them bought 50 acres. Some built shanties to live in. The more affluent built log houses. Several log houses built by these pioneers are still being used to live in today. They have been remodeled and covered with siding.

In those days there ere no old folks homes, no orphan homes or locks on doors. Today you have to lock the doors every time you leave. It used to be that all an Indian had to do when he left

his home, even for years, was to lean a stick across the doorway and nobody would touch his stuff. The historian telling this tale didn't say what was in the Indian's home. When I went to Alaska in 1971 I visited an Indian graveyard in Whitehorse Yukon Territory. They bury their dead underground and leave all his belongings at the time of his death in a hut on top of his grave. If all he owned was in the huts I looked at, no wonder nobody stele any of his possessions.

In regards to old folks homes, the custom of the early settlers was that each family took care of their own. It was always considered a consciensious obligation. There was such a thing as a poor house near Clinton which is now Huron View. One of the reasons why old people were happier long ago was because they could sit on the front porch and watch the world go by; now they dit in a rest home (even if they are not tired) and all they see is one another go by. only early settlers from quebec that I can remember that went to the poor house were Pierre, Zoe and Joe Charette. Then the caretaker came to pick them up to take them to Clinton, they brought John La Porte to help them convince Zoe that they would be better off in the "Poor House". They were old and unable to take care of their own physical needs. Then Zoe died, she was buried in St. Peter's Cemetery. The question as to who should pay for the funeral was settled as follows: Father Rondeau stated there would be no charge for the services. It was suggested that a collection of friends and neighbors put in each a doller and that the grave digger, Jeseph Corriveau, donate his time to dig the grave. Er. Corriveau objected, but agreed to denate a dollar like all the rest, but wanted to get paid to dig the grave. After the funeral mass, before the coffin was lowered in the grave, it has decided that they should view the corpse. The coffin was opened and to their disguet they noticed that the corpse was held in place in the coffin by stuffing eld newspapers around the corpse.

Making a living on a farm war much more difficult than it is today. Farm implements consisted of a che-f arm plow, a small disc, a couple sections of harrows, a chall cultivator, a six-foot hay mover, (also used as a reaper for help) a six-foot binder, a roller, a hay rake and, if you were offluent, you owned a hay loader and a manure spreader.

Before cutting the grain, the corners of the field (usually 10 acres) were cradled (similar to seythe with long times which extended to the length of the blade). This was done so that no grain would be trampled by the borses pulling the binder. Only two horses were used for the first round so that loss grain would be trampled. One man followed the binder and removed the sherves from the grain and placed them along the fence so that the binder, when making the next round in reverse direction, would not run over the sheaves. All grain was stocked and let dry before pathering it in the barn for thrashing.

The first beans harvested along 1% or 'l' were worked with a single scuffler, heed two or large libes, rulled by hand the

first year, put in bunches to dry, hauled to the barn and thrashed on the barn floor with a flail (two pieces of round wood about 3 inches in diameter, three feet long, fastened together by a leather strap about 5 inches long). The bean straw was removed, the beans put through a fanning mill, then hand-picked on the kitchen table, where all the spoiled and discolored beans were removed before they were bagged ready to sell.

Potatoes were plowed out of the ground, then grubbed out of the dirt by hand.

THE DENOMME GENEALOGY

The etymology of the name is believed to have originated from the word L'Homme (the man). Why our ancestors carried the name Delaunay in 1631 and why it was changed to DeLomey in 1694 then Denomme in 1728 is still unknown. All the research and records have never revealed anything except that many names have changed completely as was mentioned in the chapter on Genealogy and Family Names.

There were several colonists, fur traders, administrators named Delaunay that came from France in the early seventeenth century.

Pierre Delaunay: Son of Gilles and Louise Dubois. Born 1616, Fresnay-le-Boisme au Main, France. Married, November 7, 1645 at Quebec to Francoise Pinguet. She was the daughter of Henry and Louise Lousche. She was 2 years old when she came to Canada with her parents May 31, 1634. Pierre became a warder for his father-inlaw in the fur trading post of Tadausac. They were agents for the company known as "The Hundred Associates." He signed a contract with Nicolas Froget wherein he furnished the merchandise and Nicolas was to take it to Montreal. They had 20 big axes, 6 little axes, 100 lbs. of lead, 2 guns and 1 lb. of ivery combs. They were to split the profit equally. Guimont, Pinguet and Pierre Delaunay were, no doubt, well known to each other before leaving France. Jeanne Delaunay was the wife of Francois Guimont who was the father of Louis Guimont that came to Canada prior to 1650. They all were associated with the fur trade. On November 28, 165+, Pierre was killed by the Iroquois. He was buried in the cript of Notre Dame de Quebec.

Charles Delaunay: Born 1648, son of Mierre & Francoise Pinguet. In 1686 Henri Tonti who had set out to meet LaSalle built a fortified house on the Arkansas River about 5 leagues from it's mouth. He left 6 men there. 2 were from Rouen; Jean Couture and Charles Delaunay. The following year they joined LaSalle and his companions to St. Louis. LaSalle was killed on this, his last expedition on the Mississippi. He married Marie-Anne Legras, they had thirteen children. He was a tanner by trade.

Jacques Delaunay: Son of Louis and Marguerite Orleans. Born 1600 in Rouen, France. Married February 25, 1670 at St. Famille, Isle of Orleans to Catherine Besnard.

Nicolas Delaunay: Born 1633 in Tourouvre, France. Married in 1661 at Quebec to Antoinette Durand from St. Godard de Rouen, France. Daughter of Guillaume and Marguerite Letellier. She was the widow of Morin Duval.

David Delaunay: In 1827 four men and two women of the Osage Indians were brought to France by David Delaunay. They were taken on a tour through France, Belgium, Holland, Germany, Switzerland and Italy. By 1829 Delaunay abandoned them. Through the generosity of some Parisians and Bishop Dubourg, they were returned to their people.

Joseph Denomme: In the Journals of Henry Alexander and David Thompson of the Northwest Company: March 16th - Denomme and Sansregret set off for the South Branch. 17th - Hudson Bay - "Men off with 10 horse sleds loaded with baggage for the Terre Blanche. J. Durand's wife ill of an abortion. The wife of Francois Deschamps, Jr. was delivered of a boy, and an hour afterwards was running about the fort. How happy it is for the Indian woman that childbirth has so little effect upon them." note: Joseph Denomme is listed as, voyageur, N. W. Co. on Lower Red River, 1804 and P. Denomme as interpreter, N. W. Co. Fort des Prairies 1804.

Jean Delaunay: Son of Thomas Delaunay and Antoine Gobin. Born 1637 at St. Michel-du-Pont, Rouen, France. Married September 30, 1669 at Quebec to Marie Fleaueau (Nicolas and Sebastienne Beajorian of St. Germain, France). He was a doctor in Canada.

THE GENEALOGY OF THE DENOMMES IN HURON COUNTY ONTARIO

FIRST GENERATION

Claude Delaunay: Son of Simon and Jeanne Cellier. Born 1631 in St. Jean-du-Rouvray, near Abbeville in Picardie, France. He came to Canada in 1666. Married October 3, 1669 at St. Famille, Isle of Crleans, Quebec to Denyse Leclerc (Jean and Jeanne Nigremont). She was born in the diocese of Notre Dame de Gometz, Paris, France. After Claude died she married Martin Daleret, widower of Aime Fontaine, February 19, 1703, at St. Laurent, Isle of Crleans, Quebec. In the census of 1666 Claude is registered as rope maker. He owned a farm on the Isle of Orleans. There is a record of a Claude Sr. de Launay being engaged in the recruitment of colonists that sailed on the ship Saint Jehan from LaRochelle on April 1, 1636. He could have been a brother of Simon Delaunay. During that period many were recruited to work in the fur trade for the "The Hundred Associates" who had a monopoly on all exports from New France. This was replaced by the "Compagnie des Habitants". The revenue of the fur trade came from as far north as the Mackenzie River and the Hudson Bay.

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





The church of St. Francois, Isle of Orleans.



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

Dear Mr. Denommé:





Thanks again for your kindness. We certainly enjoyed our visit to the "Sauble Line".





JEAN DURAND'S MARRIAGE & FAMILY

It was the custom in the 17th century for a couple engaged to marry, to sign a contract several weeks before the wedding date. The signing of this contract was a very celebrated occasion and was sometimes accompanied by as many guests as the religious ceremony.

In 1661 a young girl, Marie Fayette, a "King's Daughter" from Paris landed at Quebec along with 20 others. On October 3, 1661 she became Jean Durand's fiance. They presented themselves to the Notary Guillaume Audouart to sign the marriage contract. Some of the invited guests were witnesses to the contract. There was Pierre Boucher, ex governor of the Fort, and Three Rivers, Charles Gautier, Louis du Ponty, Andre Foucault. The presence of Pierre Boucher, who was by far the most important personage of New France tends to indicate that Jean Durand may have served as a soldier under this most impressive figure of the first 200 years of Canadian history. After Pierre Boucher's service as Governor of Three Rivers he founded Boucherville and was enobled by King Louis XIV.

After the celebration of the engagement party the future "bride" returned to the convent and Jean to his farm to make ready for the wedding which was to take place at a later date. The proverb, "out of sight, out of mind" must have applied in those days because on January 12, 1662 we find Jean and Marie at Charles Achapt in the presence of a notary to cancel their engagement contract by mutual consent. After her third engagement, she married Nicolas Huot on July 24, 1662.

Madeleine de Chauvigny de la Peltrie, with the help of Marie de l'Incarnation, established a convent at Quebec to educate and instruct young Indian orphan girls. They taught them the art of homemaking and the virtues that characterized our first ancestors. It was at this convent that Jean Durand found his bride.

After formal introductions and a short courtship, Jean Durand and Catherine Annannontak became engaged and signed a contract to marry on September 23, 1662. This was a great occasion and many notables were invited. Catherine was accompanied by Madeleine de Chauvigny and Jean by Charles Gautier. The contract was drawn up by Guillaume Audouart, Secretary to the Consul established at Quebec by the King of France. The principle clauses established the common interest of the couple. Jean endowed his future wife with 400 pounds and all his goods. Catherine brought with her an endowment of 350 pounds. This consisted of a 200 pound note that Martin Boutet, representing the father of Catherine, presented, signed by the purser of the Jesuit College of Quebec, and a transseau valued at 150 pounds.

The outstanding features of the occasion was the honor paid to the couple by the community. A list of some of their friends and attendants and their positions in public life and society clearly shows these ancestors were held in great esteem. Catherine, because she was a well known Indian maiden and one of the first to officially marry a French colonist. Jean for the many heartbreaking chores he had performed so well during his three years of service as a soldier and colonist and later a homesteader. The following are listed on the document as witnesses and friends:

- Charles Gautier Charles and his family had lived in Canada for twenty five years and was well established at Cap-Rouge. He had formed an association with his neighbors for mutual protection against the Iroquois Indians. On April 27, 1651 he captured two Indians that were in pursuit of his neighbor Nicolas Pinel. He was also very well known to Pierre Boucher who was the commanding officer at Three Rivers.
- Pierre Duquet A law student who in 1663 purchased the office of Guillaume Audouart who had drawn up the marriage contract for Jean and Catherine. He became a very prominent lawyer.
- Jean Madry A medic and an old friend of Charles Gautier.
- <u>Pierre Pinel</u> A neighbor of Jean's from Cap Rouge who later died from an arrow shot by an Iroquois. Jean purchased a part of his farm after his death.
- Jean Drouard Jean's associate in leasing land from Charles Gautier.
- Martin Boutet He represented the father of Catherine, also acted as substitute to the Jesuit Fathers who were like tutors to Catherine. He was a man of great virtue and culture. After the death of his wife, his daughter entered the convent and he joined the Jesuits as a teacher of mathematics, physics, engineering and navigation. He was also the parish musician. He was honored by the King and given a "Brief of Engineering" in the King's handwriting, with all the accompanying privileges and favors attached to the title.
- Laurent Dubog He married, a few days before Jean, Marie Felix, the daughter of the first Huron Indian chief that was baptised (Joachim Arontis). Marie was also raised by the Ursulines and educated in the French language. A daughter became a nun.
- Madam de la Peltrie She was the widow of Knight Baron de la Peltrie. She was born of a noble family and very wealthy. It was her financial support that brought about the founding of the Ursuline Convent in Quebec. Her devotion and personal attention to the orphan Indian girls was outstanding. She was a mother to them in every detail of their becoming worthy brides for future colonists.
- Etienette Despres She was the widow of the governor of Three Rivers who, along with 15 other frenchmen, had been massacred on Aug. 19, 1652.

The pastor of Notre Dame de Quebec signed the marriage act that Catherine was from the parish of The Conception in Huron Country. Father Joseph Marie Chaumonat was in charge of this mission for ten years. He, therefore, knew Chief Nicolas Arendanki and Jeanne Otriho-andet, the father and mother of Catherine. He was the Jesuit priest who had taken care of the refugees, widows and infants after the massacre of the Huron Missions now known as Martyrs' Shrine, Midland, Ontario.

Attending the wedding September 26, 1662 was Father Jerome Lalemont the uncle of St. Gabriel Lalemont, Martyr, and Francois LeMercier who also was a missionary at the Huron Missions and was

familiar with the horrors and the famine of the "Huron Massacre". It was through their efforts that the refugees reached Quebec and that the orphan Catherine was placed in the Ursuline convent. The Jesuits were always concerned with the progress of these orphans and often inquired as to their well being to the extent of giving Catherine a dowry when she married Jean.

THEIR FAMILY

Their first child was baptised at Sillery, Quebec, June 4, 1666. She was named Marie. She married at Montreal on July 31, 1688 to Mathurin Cadot (Rene & Renee Rosgand) from Poitou, France. Their grandson, Jean Baptiste Cadot, built himself a house near Sault St. Marie and became very influential with the Indians and the fur traders. He was proclaimed a chief and married the Sauteux Indian Chief's daughter, Anastasie. In 1765 Jean Baptiste Cadot and Alexander Henry, an English merchant, formed an association to exploit the fur trade extending their routes as far as the Saskatchewan River. In 1775 they enlarged their company by joining up with Joseph & Thomas Frobfisher and Peter Pond which was the origin of the Northwest Company.

Their second child was Ignace, born 1669; married in 1691 to Marie Catherine Baullon of Quebec. He also was a "coureur de bois" and made many trips up the Ottawa River. He left no descendants.

Their third and last child was Louis, born 1670; married in 1698 to Elisabeth Agnes Michel (Oliver & Madeleine Cochon). She died May 12, 1718 leaving him with 10 children, the youngest only 3 months old. He remarried 1719 to Jeanne Houde (Jean & Anne Rouleau) who was a widow who had married twice before and had 4 or 5 children from Pierre Demers, her first husband and 2 from Jean Magnon, her second husband. They had 4 children making a total family of 20 or 21.

He also was a fur trader and went up the Ottawa in his teens and associated with his brother-in-law and cousins. He made many voyages to Mackinac. One of the last being for Mrs. Lamothe Cadillac whose husband was the founder of Detroit. This developed into quite an experience for Louis and his partner Joseph Moreau. Contrary to Cronkite's famous closing remarks "and that's the way it is", it is "This is the way it was".

Louis Durand and Lamothe Cadillac

On April 11, 1696 Louis Durand with Joseph Moreau appeared at Notary Antoine Adhemar to draw up a contract. They were hired to deliver, to Antoine de Lamothe-Cadillac, Captain of a company of a Navy detachment, and Commander for the King at Michillimakinac, a canoe of merchandise that Marie-Therese Guyon, wife of Lamothe-Cadillac would provide. Louis and Joseph promised to leave with a convoy departing Ville-Marie soon, and take the best care possible of the merchandise without assuming full liability. Mrs Lamothe was to furnish the customary provisions for the voyagers to get to Michillimakinac. On their return to Ville-Marie the following September, Mrs. Lamothe was to pay them each a salary of one hundred pounds in money of the country. Each were permitted to bring a hundred pounds of merchandise that they could trade for their own profit.

On April 14 the same three persons arrived at Notary Adhemar to cancel the first contract and rewrite a similar one with much the same terms as indicated by several other documents. However, the new contract itself was not found.

Instead of going up the river with only one cance of merchandise the two voyagers made a verbal agreement with Mrs. Lamothe to take two more cances. She had obtained a permat from Governor Frontenac for only one.

An unfortunate incident happened before they departed. While they were loading their second cance at the head of the Lachine Rapids, Commissioner Latouche, on order of the intendant, confiscated a part of the merchandise; which was then sold at auction. This brought, after all expenses paid, a net of 175 pounds which was turned over to Hotel Disu (City Hall). The empty cance was then filled with surplus goods from the extra two cances.

Durand and Moreau, no less cunning than Mrs. Lamothe, loaded seven hundred pounds of personal wares, over two hundred pounds more than had been agreed upon. They placed this merchandise in some of the Indians' canoes that were not full and were making the trip in the same convoy.

The convoy arrived at Michillimakinac without further incident. The Commander M. deLamothe-Cadillac gave the two voyagers that brought his merchandise a big welcome. He soon encouraged them to form an association to trade with the Sioux Indians, one of the most ferocious tribes of the West. (ref: Les Canadian de l'Ouest p. 327)

Lamothe-Cadillac urged them to join up with another voyager that had arrived from Ville-Marie by the name of Mathieu Sauton. This voyager had carried merchandise in his cance worth 1530 pounds. Cadillac had personal interest in the association and assured them he would furnish 7,000 pounds of articles to trade.

Lamothe-Cadillac, who was then the Commander of the fur trading post and Fort Michillimakinac, has been extoled by many authors and seemingly they did not exaggerate. However, like many great men one reads about in past history, he was not without blemishes. Governor Vandreuil, in 1708, stated "He is hated equally by the soldiers, the inhabitants and the Indians who have no consideration nor respect for him. They all regard him as a selfish manhe endeavors to get as much money as he can by whatever means he can." He is accused of having in mind only his own personal interest. Commissioner LaTouche, who confiscated a part of the merchandise at Lachine Rapids, once wrote, "No man ever amassed so great a fortune in so short a time and caused so much turmoil by the evils of which he has been accused, the details of which we have received." The political atmosphere didn't change much in 260 years. Conflict of interest by the ruling class always existed.

Unfortunately for our two fur traders, Durand and Moreau, Cadillac regardless of his sticky fingers had a lot of influence at Versailles and at Quebec with Governor Frontenac. Like most politicians, he

could "blow hot one day, cold the next", because by the end of the month when news of the incident that happened at Lachine came to his attention he became very unfriendly towards them. The incident had put him in an unfavorable position with the intendant in charge. he had already been reproached numerous times for dealing in contraband merchandise forbidden by order of the King. This time Cadillac was unable to absolve himself in the eyes of the intendant. Many times before he had pleaded innocent of the offenses and had assured that the complaints against him had no foundation.

Cadillac became very angry with the two associates and after wrangling with them he had Louis Durand arrested on the pretense that he had answered him in an insolent manner. He went so far as having him punished and put in jail on the serious accusation of having wounded a dog belonging to an Indian.

Louis notified Cadillac that he would be unable to fulfill his obligation with him because he was in jail. Joseph Moreau, on his part, refused to fulfill the contract alone. On account of this he also was incarcerated on the unfounded accusation to have sought to have his associate released.

Cadillac did not stop there. While the two were in jail, he had the sergeant and soldiers of the garrison inventory all the merchandise in their hut. He seized and removed everything; their guns, provisions, canoes, even their strong box.

Among the many articles inventoried is listed twenty pounds of lead, five barrels of gun powder, fifteen bags of corn, a piece of red drape from Limbourg - 18 yards, worth twelve pounds, blankets, a pair of socks from Saint Mazant, a service coat, seven packs of beaver skins, twenty-six pounds four ounces of beaver grease, eighteen pounds of dry beaver, two otter skins, two odd skins, three deer hides, a quantity of dry goods, eighteen pounds of bait, atc., etc. The strong box contained a pack of papers, two razors, a mirror, a seal, a stick of Spanish wax, a half pound of pepper, salt, mustard, a penknife, a knife, six decks of cards, a writing pad and valuable papers, one of which was an obligation in his favor for sixteen hundred pounds and fifteen hundred pounds worth of credit slips received from various persons for jugs of spirits that were sold. Cadillac had the unbelievable impudence to have these rewritten in his own favor.

When they were released from jail, they were penniless and had to borrow in order to live. They eventually succeeded in procuring a quantity of merchandise and left to trade with the Sioux. They later returned to the colony and awaited Lamothe-Cadillac to demand justice. This was prolonged until September, 1697.

Louis Durand and Joseph Moreau presented to the intendant a long petition which comprised, first of all their wages of two hundred pounds and all the merchandise, credit tickets, personal effects and equipment taken from them, plus the profit they would have made on their merchandise. On the bottom of their petition, there was an order from Intendant Champigny dated September 14, 1697

to the effect that Lamothe was to answer to the petition in three days. Bailiff Priour notified Lamothe the same day and was assigned to appear the following Tuesday at 9 a.m. Lamothe and the complainants finally compromised on November 23 to accept a common referee, Hazeur and Pachot, to arbitrate their differences.

However, before the arbitrators had a chance to appraise their differences, an inquest took place. Judge Dupuis, who was a very honest, upright person, hard to circumvent, judging by the annalist of Hotel-Dieu, who, on numerous occasions had an opportunity to appraise his high qualities and virtues, was heading the inquest.

The inquest consisted of knowing the value of the merchandise involved at the point of sale which was Chaouamigon in Sioux Country, where Louis and Joseph had gone after being released from prison. Dupuis proceeded with the inquest in spite of the opposition of Lamothe. The next day, M. deFrontenac sent for Dupuis and he was thrown in jail for ruling over the Commandant Cadillac and therefore, himself, Frontenac. This further complicated matters.

Louis Durand, who was paying room and board in Quebec City from September 24, 1697 in order to follow the court case, could not see his way clear to remain to see it to completion. Consequently, on January 23, 1698 he & Lamothe agreed, before Notary Rageot, to a settlement.

That same day he received a note from Lamothe promising to pay 250 pounds to Nicolas Janvrin, a merchant in Montreal, to whom Louis was indebted for the merchandise he had purchased before departing on his last trip to Michillimakinac. Cadillac did not pay this note until October 17, the date endorsed on the note by Janvrin. This seems to be the total compensation for Louis' last voyage.

From this episode it is evident that it was then, as it is now, just as difficult to receive justice when you are poor and contesting against the influence of money and politics. Louis paid a high price. Having acquired the conviction that a bad deal is better than a good lawsuit that never ends, he sacrificed his wages for his voyage to Michillimakinac, the value of his personal belongings and the dealings in which he had been frustrated. He preferred peace, and the only price he felt was left to him was to discontinue the lawsuit.

Joseph Moreau pursued for justice on his own behalf. The proceedings went back and forth from Quebec to Montreal and finally was referred to the Secretary of State in Paris, M. Pontchartrain, to find out what the King's wishes were in the matter. Judgement was rendered on April 22, 1698. Lamothe was condemned to pay Moreau the sum of 3,420 pounds, 6 deniers. Two days later, after Moreau expressed satisfaction to settle; Lamothe, to prevent its execution, presented an inquest to Governor Frontenac. The governor issued an ordinance forbidding the intendant to execute judgement against Cadillac, under pain of disobediance, until he was able to let His Majesty know his intentions.

Joseph Moreau decided to go to France in October to plead for justice at the feet of His Majesty, the King. Lamothe, fearing the results, offered to settle for 1600 French pounds (worth 4 times more) and got influential people to try to convince Moreau that it would

be to his advantage to discontinue doing anything that might embarrass the Governor. On October 9, 1698, Notary Gilles Rageot drew up a discharge document for Moreau settling the suit between he and Lamothe.

In order to assure himself that he had not hurt his own interest Frontenac deputised Cadillac, the Commander of Michillimakinac to France as his official messenger in 1698. Shortly after the Commander left for France, Frontenac became sick and died November 28, 1698. This removed most of the importance to the affair in the courts but there were repercussions for many years later. Sauton's case, the third partner at Michillimakinac, was finally settled October 20, 1699. Lamothe was ordered to pay him 936 pounds. As late as July 1, 1706 Moreau was again in the courts trying to collect money on some notes received as payment from Cadillac.

Louis Durand never attended school, and could neither read or write. However, at a very young age he could read the great book of nature which taught a great deal of practical knowledge. The forests, lakes, and rivers held no secrets for this "Coureur des bois". He knew the trees and herbs of the forest, the properties of each, the habits of all the animals of the forests, how to hunt and trap them. He knew all the kinds of fish and how to catch them. He knew how to make a canoe from the bark of a tree and how to navigate it up and down the rivers and rapids, how to build a boat that could withstand the storms of the gulf, to put on a pair of snow shoes and overcome deep snow for twelve to fifteen miles in one day.

There was a time in his life when he thought nothing of leaving for the wilderness of Labrador in Eskimo land, the shores of the Great Lakes, the Missouri River in Sioux Country or just a short voyage in neighboring forests. Very few situations found him unprepared; he was the man for unforseen circumstances. Had he not journeyed America from Labrador to the Western Prairies? Frequented the many Indian nations to hunt? Was he not familiar with the dialects and customs of the many tribes he met in his travels?

Providence endowed him with an adventurous nature that knew no bounds, and rendered him capable to be, in succession, an adventurer, interpreter, coureur des bois or fur trader, fisherman, later a colonist, homesteader, farmer, carpenter, a militia officer and even a highway director.

The choice made by Lamothe-Cadillac to send a trading expedition to the Sioux Country when so many hundreds were available speaks highly of the confidence inspired, of the resourcefulness, judgement and ability of Louis Durand.

Regardless of anything, the life of Louis Durand should leave a deep furrow in the history of the Canadian people because he left a numerous posterity.

This posterity that will multiply itself indefinitely from generation to generation, will march in his footsteps and guard his manner, his traits, the faith and soul of the ancestor. Thereby, jointly with the other pioneers of New France, Louis Durand will immortalize

and will contribute to assure the survival by his descendants the continuation of the French race on this continent.

Many colonists of New France were unknown heroes. Unfortunately, history pays little attention to the small and the humble; it abides in the helmet of the great captains, but it forgets to decorate the conscript that saved the day in the heat of combat. Likewise the history of Canada that rendered so fully, justice to the great heroes, what heroes it forgot! Heroes who had so much merit that they ignored the value of their exploits, as much as the greatness of their morals, their faith and their honesty.

Louis Durand, less known than many others, no doubt because he wasn't always in the front ranks. Nevertheless, just received in the memory of his descendants, a nice honorable mention. Those who have some of his blood in their veins, even to the eleventh or twelfth generation, have reason to be glad of this ancestor and should honor his memory.

Such is the history of Louis Durand, our second Canadian ancestor, and such is that of his children. From Lanorie his descendants spread on the borders of the north shore parishes, later the offspring took root in far away lands, either in Quebec, or provinces of Canada, even in the frontiers of the United States.

We have stated how the Durand family was established in Canada. It remains to be seen how it has grown, it remains to pursue its descent even in its most recent ramifications. This is the task to which we will apply ourselves, in the latter part of this work. However, due to the numerous descendants, this will be restricted to the enumeration of the direct lineage as it concerns our family and will be limited to the indication of their civil status; birth, marriage and death and indications which are sufficient to the researcher to give him the joy and happiness to follow the chain that links him to his first ancestor in this country.

MARRIAGE CONTRACT OF IGNACE DURAND AND MARIE MIVILLE (G. Rageot, N.P. January 26, 1691)

Before Gilles Rageot Notary Registrar of the King, our Lord. in the District of Quebec in New France were present in person Ignace Durand, residing in Villemarie of Montreal, son of the deceased Jean Durand and of Catherine Annonnontak, his father and mother, of the one part, and Marie Catherine Kiville, daughter of the late Jacques Miville and of Catherine Marie Baillon of the parish of Our Lady of this city of the other part. Both parties of their own free will and wish, with the consent of their parents and in the presence of their relatives and friends, assembled here for this purpose: On the side of Durand his brother Louis Durand, Jean Lefebvre, Pierre Presseau, Georges Cauvle and Paul Lessart; and on the part of the said Miville-Pierre Amiot, Olivier Michel, Jacques Thibierge, Louise Regnand, wife of said Amiot, Marguerite Amiot, wife of Jean Jolly, Catherine Ursule Amiot, wife of Jean Duquet, Marie Magdelaine Michel, Anne Jolly, wife of said Thibierge, cousins and first cousins of said young girl; Pierre Lezeau, Rene Pasquier, Jean Lemaistre, Louise Lemaistre and Helaine Lemieux, wife of said l'asquier, their friends; the said contracting parties have acknowledged and agreed to have concluded and passed these promises and contract of marriage on the following conditions: Said Ignace Durand has promised and promises to take for his legitimate spouse said Marie Catherine Miville, and she, too, promises to take him for her legitimate husband. This marriage to be solemnized according to the rites of our Holy Mother Apostolic Roman Church in the shortest possible time appointed upon agreement and deliberation of their relatives and friends. The future husband and wife will own jointly, according to the customs of Paris accepted in this land, all real estate and other possessions from the day of their marriage. The future husband and wife agree to take each other with all their rights and privileges; but they will not be responsible for debts contracted by one of them before the marriage; in case such debts were encurred, the party who had contracted them will pay them out of his or her property. Furthermore, the future wife will be endowed with the customary downy, or with a sum of six hundred pounds of fixed dowry to be paid at her choice. In case of the dissolving of said marriage without children born out of it, said future husband and wife donate, each one to the survivor respectively, all their property in real estate and otherwise, including properties acquired by them and owned by them at the day of death of the first to die. The survivor may enjoy and dispose of this properties at his or her pleasure. The present document to be registered in the proper places in four months time, as it is ordered by Law. The future husband and wife constitute as their representative and executive the holder of the present document, to whom they give the right of having the clauses thereof executed .. Thus and so Promising & etc ... Obligating etc ... Rencuncing & etc... Made and passed in said Quebec at the home of said Amiot in the afternoon on the twenty-fifth day of January, Sixteen hundred ninety one, in the presence of Maitre Nicolas Mesnu,

bailiff and of Pierre LeRoux, residing in Quebec, witnesses, who have signed with said future wife, relatives and friends as well as the Notary. The future husband, Ignace Durand, Tessier, Presseau, Pierre Amiot, Pierre Lezeau, Lemaistre, Pasquier, Marguerite Amiot, Catherine Ursule Amiot and Renard (sic) Marie Magdelaine Michel, having declared not to know how to read, write or sign, the present document had been read to them according to Law.

Contract of Louis Durand for the Company that is Mr. Bellefeuille with the consent of the associates in favor of said Mr. Bellefeuille.

Louis Durand of Batiscan in said village who was hired and has promised to go up the Ottawa for the service of the Messrs. Claude Rivard and Charles Dizis. At this point accepting to do as much for them as their other associates and during one entire year starting on the 10th of August last. And help to carry to said destination merchandise for trading and having arrived, help to bring down the beaver pelts and during this time to do all that will be directed that is honest and legitimate for the profit of said associates. And advise them of their damage if they become pillaged. In case the said Durand is held over and above the said year more or less he will be paid at prorata of wages cited. After this declaration, said Durand traveled to the place of Mr. Bellefeuille, one of the said associates the agreement made in regards the said association will be held responsible to furnish some wine to said Durand during the said time for the usage of the voyagers, and over and above the sum of 250 livres that the said Mr. Rivard and Dizis herein named promising pay and lodging to said Durand in beaver pelts at the market price in this village at the return of his voyage. It is also permitted to said Durand to trade his gun, a blanket, six shirts, a coat, the beaver and other skins he would acquire in trade for his personal articles without paying freight for same on his return. This agreement arrived at Ville Marie in the law office in the year 1691 the 4th day of September before noon in the presence of Francois Lory and Francois Bourgonniere, witnesses, living at Ville Marie signing hereunder with the said Messrs. Rivard, Dizis and said notary. Durand claims to be unable to write or sign his name.

After the above agreement was made the said Dizis made known for himself as for the associates herein named consented that the said Durand take the place of Bellefeuille, with the understanding that he pay him his wages and that he retains, at the return of the voyage, his part of the beaver pelts and other furs of the said associates, without being sued, because he couldn't go himself being he was sick. At that time the said Durand who was promised that in case the associates did not come back the next year, 1692, promises to stay for the said Bellefeuille another year which in that case would be 1693 for the sum of 300 livres that Mr. Mathurin Guillet at this time was making for said Bellefeuille, his brother, promises to pay him from his part of the beaver pelts of the said associates on his return. The said agreement arrived this day by the said Dizis, Rivard and Durand is to be in effect as of now at Ville Marie,

office of the Notary in the year 1691 the 4th of September after noon in the presence of Lory and Francois Bourgonniere, witnesses living at Ville Marie. Undersign with Mr. Dizis the said Mr. Guillet and the said Louis Durand who declared he could not write or sign.


