#### **FOREWORD**

This work is intended as a tribute to the first settlers who managed to create an enduring, firmly established society in Essex County. Through them and their descendants we will see the history of the area. From the viewpoint of genealogy, we will trace the evolution of the francophone community in Windsor and vicinity.

Unfortunately, I have had to be selective among the families studied. I would have liked to be able to trace them all -- particularly the Robinettes, Langlois, Renauds, Poujets, Bondys, Laffertés -- families with so many descendants still living in the area. It is with regret, then, that I have restricted my research to families descending from pioneers who settled before 1780.

May their descendants take pride in having survived through two centuries, maintaining their language and their culture while adapting to their environment.

#### **HISTORY**

#### DETROIT

In his preface to <u>The Windsor Border Region</u> by Father E. Lajeunesse, Mr. Leslie Frost, then Premier of Ontario, wrote:

"There is only one locality in the Province of Ontario that can claim a continuous settlement antedating the British conquest. That locality is the Windsor area on the Canadian side of the Detroit River."

Indeed, the Windsor area, like the Detroit area, owes its origin to the establishment of Fort Pontchartrain in 1701. When Sieur de Lamothe Cadillac arrived in the area to establish a trading post, he brought with him in the twenty-five canoes that made up his expedition, as many settlers and craftsmen as soldiers. Since Montreal was too far distant to effectively supply this post, all the necessities of daily life had to be produced on the site.

The first years were hard. Many settlers, in discouragement, returned to Montreal. In 1712, the fort was attacked by the Fox Indians, bitter enemies of the French. After this attack and until 1730, Fort Pontchartrain became an isolated trading post, with a small garrison, a few voyageurs and eleven stubborn families, like the Campeaus, Meloches, Janis, Réaumes, Bigras, Roys, Fafards.

However, about 1730, the post became active once again.

More and more voyageurs and traders made it their operating
base. Then new settlers arrived. In 1734, Governor

Beauharnois granted lands on both sides of the Detroit River.

### THE FIRST HURON MISSION

The settling of the Canadian side of the Detroit River is closely tied in with the Huron Mission. To promote the fur trade, Lamothe Cadillac offered the Indian tribes the protection of the fort. First there were the Hurons who had taken shelter at Michilimakinac after the destruction of their village, Ste. Marie. They located a quarter of a mile from the post but the commandant gave them a vast territory on the opposite shore. Then came the Ottawas and finally the Saulteaux who just passed through.

In 1728, after repeated requests from the Indians, the Jesuits of Quebec sent them a missionary, Father Armand de la Richardie. An initial mission was established at Bois-Blanc Island, today Bob-lo Island. It was called Notre-Dame de l'Assomption. Father Richardie built a chapel and a mission house there. Craftsmen immediately gathered around the mission.

After fifteen years of toil, the weary missionary asked for assistance. Father Pierre Potier was sent to help him and arrived September 26, 1744, to remain until his death July 16, 1781 at the age of 73.

In 1733, Father de la Richardie made a contract with Jean Cécile, a toolmaker and gunsmith living at the post of Detroit, to become the blacksmith for six years. Cécile promised to build a house

there for himself and his family. It seems that he went back to Detroit without keeping his promise.

### THE FIRST SETTLERS

The Jesuits' first resident farmer at Bois-Blanc Island was Jean-Baptiste Goyau. He contracted to be a lease farmer on July 7, 1743, and arrived with his family the following September.

Jean-Baptiste Goyau was born in Montreal on October 13, 1688, of the marriage of Guillaume Gouyau and Hélène Benoit, or Livernois. He set out for Detroit on September 5, 1712, where he became a voyageur and trader. When he married Marie Larose on January 29, 1720, in Detroit, husband and wife were referred to as "both residents of the fort". In 1743, he became resident farmer for the Jesuit fathers. He followed the Jesuits when they settled on the Canadian side of the Detroit River. It was there he died on May 6, 1778, leaving three boys and five girls. It seems likely that this was the first French family to settle in what is now the province of Ontario.

Other French settlers gathered around the mission from its establishment. Jacques Gaudet, or Marintet, married Marguerite St. Martin on August 15, 1743. We also find Jean-Baptiste Pilet, Pierre Chesne, Jean-Baptiste St. Martin.

That mission was destroyed by the Iroquois around 1747. Then, for its reconstruction, the Hurons donated a piece of their land, called "La Pointe de Montréal", on the other side of the river across from Detroit. It was given that name by the

French of Detroit because boats coming from Montreal could first be seen from that point when entering the Detroit River. And so Notre-Dame de l'Assomption de la Pointe de Montréal came into being. A number of settlers from Bois-Blanc Island followed the missionaries to the new site.

### THE SOUTH SHORE

Construction of the new mission was begun in 1748. Once again, a chapel, a mission house, a forge and a store were built. The workmen were the same as for the first mission -- Pierre Meloche, carpenter, Laurent Parent, also a carpenter, and François-Nicolas Janis, mason. Since Jean-Baptiste Goyau's contract as resident farmer was now completed, he was given a land grant on the south shore at the present location of Goyau and Ouellet Streets. Nicolas Campeau replaced him as farmer for the Jesuits. In April, 1749, the forge was completed and Father Potier engaged Charles Chauvin as blacksmith.

# THE MISSION BUILDERS

- Pierre Meloche: born in Montreal, September 1, 1701, he was the son of François Meloche and Marie Mouflet. On August 16, 1729, he married Marie Caron at Lachine. Shortly afterward, he settled at Detroit. By 1754 he had established a saw mill on the south shore.
- Laurent Parent: was also born in Montreal of the marriage of
  Michel Parent and Marie-Anne Benoit. He was already a
  resident of the fort when he married Marie Dozat on March

- 24, 1731. She died early in 1734 and on July 27 of that same year he married Jeanne Cardinal. A tradesman, he settled first at Detroit but very soon crossed to the south shore. The descendants of Laurent Parent are now the largest family in Essex County.
- François-Nicolas Janis: baptised at Quebec on January 7, 1720, he was the son of François Janis and Simonne Brousseau. He came to Detroit as a mason. There, on August 23, 1745, he married Thérèse Meloche, daughter of Pierre. While working on the Jesuit "buildings", he obtained a land grant and built himself a house. He died at L'Assomption on December 15, 1771.
- Nicolas Campeau: was a true son of the area. His father,

  Jacques Campeau, came with Lamothe Cadillac and obtained
  a land grant near the fort in 1708. He went back to

  Montreal in 1710. On the way his wife gave birth to a
  son near Niagara Falls. So Nicolas was known as "Niagara".

  In 1712, the family returned to Detroit.
- Charles Chauvin: came to Detroit as a soldier of the garrison.

  Son of Jacques Chauvin and Marie Cambon, he was born in
  Quebec in 1702. On October 27, 1726, in Detroit he
  married Marie-Anne Casse, or St.Aubin, who was the daughter
  of pioneer Jean Casse, or St.Aubin. Disbanded in 1748,
  he settled at the mission April 10, 1749. He became
  the captain of the local militia.

#### ARRIVAL OF NEW SETTLERS

At the same time, the authorities became aware of the strategic importance of the post of Detroit. Governor La Galissonière sent Joseph-Gaspard Chaussegros de Léry to research not only the fort's strategic value but also the agricultural value of the surrounding lands and ways to develop them.

In his report, dated October 22, 1749, Léry wrote:

"It is necessary then to garrison Detroit and make it proof against unpleasant events. There is no doubt that if this post falls into the hands of the English, the Upper Country will be lost to us. But, if troops, settlers and artillery are placed there, we can be assured that no matter what attempts our enemies might make, they will not be able to succeed ... If this post is well garrisoned we shall be in a position to hold the Upper Country, and from the produce of the lands that will be farmed to nourish the garrison of Detroit and even that of Fort Niagara, by means of a barge on Lake Erie ...."

La Galissonière did not wait for the report. In the spring of 1749, he decided to send settlers to Detroit. Since the colony did not have the necessary funds to bring settlers from France, the governor decided to call for volunteers from the St. Lawrence Valley. The text of the public proclamation to this end read as follows:

"Every man who will go to settle at Detroit will receive gratuitously one spade, one axe, one ploughshare, one large and one small auger. Other tools will be advanced to be paid for in two years only. The settler will also be given a cow, which he shall return at the time of the increase; the same for a sow. Seed will be advanced the first year, to be returned at the third harvest. The women and children will be supported for one year. They will be deprived of the liberality of the King, who shall give themselves up to trade instead of agriculture."3

On January 2, 1750, the offer was repeated by De La Jonquière, then governor, and expanded to include a gun, a scythe and a sickle, six hens, a rooster and six pounds of powder and as much lead. In addition, the settlers and their families would be supplied with food for eighteen months.

Most of those replying came from the Montreal area. In 1749, 46 persons arrived, men, women and children. Chaussegros de Léry accompanied the convoy. In 1750, 12 families came, a total of 57 people. Seventeen land grants were made in 1751 and 23 in 1752. Twenty-nine disbanded soldiers also settled in the area.

A topographical map of the area, drawn up by Chaussegros de Léry in 1749 indicates that the mission of Notre Dame de l'Assomption de la Pointe de Montréal already had 34 land grants. And a 1754 registry, known as the "Cicotte Book", provides further details on the new settlers and their families, as follows.

"PIERRE DINAN -- was sent from Montreal and arrived at Detroit on July 26, 1749, with his wife and three boys and three girls to take up land that has been granted to him. It is 3 arpents wide by 40 arpents deep and it is situated on the south side, abutting on the northeast (the land of) Louis Plichon and on the south-west the lands not yet granted. He received as a donation: 8 rations for 8 persons from July 26, 1749 to January 26, 1751. (Then are listed the usual tools, provisions, animals, etc.)

JEAN BAPTISTE DROUILLARD -- was sent from Montreal and arrived at Detroit on July 26, 1749, with his wife, five boys and three girls to take up the land that has been granted to him. It is 3 arpents wide by 40 arpents deep, and it is situated on the south side, abutting on the north-east (the land of) Pierre Dinan, and on the southeast the lands not yet granted. He received as a donation: 10 rations for 10 persons from July 26, 1749, to January 26, 1751. (Then are listed the usual tools, etc.)

JEAN BAPTISTE LEBEAU -- had been living at Detroit for several years when they sent up his family which he had left in Canada. Since he was considered an inhabitant of the place, Mr. de Sabrevois decided not to give him the ration. There has been granted to him a land of three arpents abutting on the northeast (the land of) the neighbor of Drouillard and on the south-west the lands not yet granted. (On list attached to the Léry map of 1749 Lafeuillade is neighbour of Drouillard.) He received as a donation: 3 rations for his wife, one boy and one girl from July 26, 1749 to January 26, 1751. (Tools etc.)

PIERRE BECQUET -- His wife with two boys and one girl arrived at Detroit on July 24, 1749. Pierre was at the Ouabache country. She was granted a piece of land but because she was unable to clear it herself, Mr. de Sabrevois gave her permission to go and get her husband. The husband died and the grant of land did not take place. She received 4 rations for 4 persons from July 24, 1749 to October 24 next. (Tools etc.)

JACQUES PILET -- had been in Detroit for a number of years when his family, that he had left at Boucherville, came to settle with him. Since he was considered to be a resident at Detroit, Mr. de Sabrevois did not want to give him a ration. Rations were granted to his wife, his son Joseph and his three daughters whom she had brought with her. To the said Joseph was granted a land of 3 arpents situated on the south side and also some agricultural implements. The father was satisfied to cultivate a small piece of land which he does not own on Hog Island. The family received 5 rations for 5 people from July 26, 1749 to January 26, 1751. (Tools etc.)

LOUIS EDELINE -- arrived at Detroit with his son to settle on a land granted to him. It is 3 arpents wide by 40 arpents deep and it is situated on the south side. He received 2 rations for 2 persons from July 26, 1749 to January 26, 1751. (Tools etc.)

FRANCOIS LEDUC DIT PERSIL -- arrived in the convoy on July 26, 1749. He was granted a land of 3 arpents on the south side. He received a ration of 18 months and provisions according to the regulations. He received one ration from July 26, 1749, to January 26, 1751. (Tools etc.)

LOUIS VILLERS -- soldier, married at Detroit, obtained land in 1749 on which he settled the same year on the south side. Louis Morain, his brother-in-law, obtained a grant of 3 arpents abutting (Louis Villers's land). Villers annexed this property to his grant according to the pleasure of Mr. Céloron. That is why 2 hoes and 2 axes are mentioned on the opposite page. Louis Morain was to use them as well as Villers to clear the land. He received  $2\frac{1}{2}$  rations from November 1, 1749 to May 1, 1751 for himself, his wife and a child. (Tools etc.)

RENE LEBEAU -- bachelor who came to Detroit on July 26, 1749, to settle on land granted to him on the south side. He went back to Montreal in 1751, married and brought back his wife who has been granted a ration. He received a ration from July 26, 1749 to January 26, 1751. His wife received a ration from August 10, 1752, to February 10, 1754. (Tools etc.)

BAPTISTE MALLET -- was a shoemaker at Detroit. In 1749 he went to Montreal with his wife and one son. The following year he obtained permission to return with his family in the King's convoy on the promise of settling on a farm of three arpents granted to him on the south side. He received 3 rations from August 3, 1750, to February 3, 1752. (Tools etc.)

FRANCOIS MALLET -- a widower who came to Detroit in 1750 with one daughter and one son to settle on three arpents of land granted to him on the south side. The son disappeared in 1752. He received three rations from August 3, 1750 to February 3, 1752. (Tools etc.)

LOUIS BINEAU -- came to Detroit in 1750 with his wife and seven children to settle on a farm of three arpents granted to him on the south side. He received  $5\frac{1}{2}$  rations from August 3, 1750, to February 3, 1752. (Tools etc.)

JACQUES BIGRAS -- arrived on August 19, 1750, with a numerous progeny. At first he was given land on the north side. His remonstrances won for him a transfer to land on the south side where the widow is living at present. Three big boys who should have been the support of their mother abandoned her. This induced her to marry Antoine Brizard who has entered into all the rights of the deceased on assuming all his debts. The family received 8 rations from August 19, 1750, to September 1, 1751. After this date they received  $4\frac{1}{2}$  rations. (Tools etc.)

NICOLAS TAVERNIER DIT ST. MARTIN -- soldier who was sent to Detroit for garrison duty. He obtained permission to marry the daughter of Bigras and to settle on a farm of 3 arpents on the south side. He died within 8 months of his marriage leaving a widow without children. He received one ration from January 9, 1751, to the time of his death in August 1751. (Tools etc.) (The entry also indicates the receipt of one coffin. His wife later married François LeBeau.)

JOSEPH METEIER -- came to Detroit on August 19, 1750, with his wife and small daughter. He was granted a land of 3 arpents on the south side. He received  $2\frac{1}{2}$  rations from August 19, 1750, to February 19, 1752. (Tools etc.)

PIERRE DUFOUR -- living at Detroit with his wife, five boys and two girls. Upon his request he was granted land on the south side opposite Turkey Island. He received  $5\frac{1}{2}$  rations from September 1, 1750, to March 1, 1752. (Tools etc.)

LOUIS ANTOINE DESHETRES, JR. -- came from St. Joseph with his father (i.e. Antoine DesHêtres who settled on the north side along the shore of Lake St. Clair). Louis was granted land on the south side near the village of the Ottawas of whom he is the interpreter. He received one ration included in the eight mentioned elsewhere.

LOUIS REVEAU -- from the town of Vif in the parish of St. Jean at two leagues from Grenoble. He had been in the Detroit garrison for several years when he obtained permission to marry the eldest daughter of Pierre Dinan. He received a grant of land 3 arpents wide on the south side on which he has settled. His wife received her ration through her father in 1749 and 1750. To him is granted one ration from January 1, 1751, to July 1, 1752. (Tools etc.)

PIERRE DURAND DIT MONTMIREL -- soldier who came to Detroit in 1750 for garrison duty. He obtained permission to marry the daughter of Pierre Dinan in order to settle on a farm which has been granted to him on the south side where he has made a small clearing. He received two rations starting in January 1751. (Tools etc.)

JEAN VALE DIT VERSAILLES -- same as Montmirel. He received two rations from January 9, 1751, to July 9, 1752. (Tools etc.) He also received 5 bushels of wheat to pay Drouillard for cutting the lumber and raising his house.

JEAN FRANCOIS LEBEAU -- same as Baptiste LeBeau, a Canadian who came to Detroit in 1749 as a passenger in the Merchants' Canoes. He obtained a grant of land but was not to be given a ration until he got married. Nicolas Tavernier above-mentioned having died, he married the widow and then received a ration from September 20, 1752, to March 20, 1754. (Tools etc.)

FRANCOIS PRUDHOMME -- came from the District of Montreal to Detroit in 1751 with a rather large family to settle on a farm granted to him opposite Turkey Island. He received 5 rations for 7 persons from September 1, 1751 to March 1, 1753. (Tools etc.)

JOSEPH ST. AUBIN -- same as Prudhomme. He received  $5\frac{1}{2}$  rations from September 1, 1751, to March 1, 1753. (Tools etc.) He also obtained 10 lbs. of tobacco and 5 lbs. of powder to pay for the hauling of his house.

CHARLES CAMPAU -- can be called a child of Detroit. In consideration of work that he has done on a farm and of his marriage to Prudhomme's daughter, he was given a ration from September 14, 1752, to March 14, 1754. (Tools etc.)

CHARLES BUTEAU -- came from Montreal in 1751, examined the country and received land on the south side. In 1752, he went back to Montreal and returned with his family. He received 5 rations from August 23, 1752, to February 24, 1754. (Tools etc.) He also received 3 lbs. of powder and 9 lbs. of lead to have his house hauled by Deline.

SIMON BERGERON -- In consideration of the fact that he married the daughter of J. B. LeBeau, he received one ration. His wife received her ration on her arrival from Montreal."4

### LIFE OF THE SETTLERS

The colony grew gradually, mostly by natural increase, since immigration from New France was negligible.

The farms, although well established, were not very productive because the sandy soil was quickly exhausted. Each farm had its orchard of apple, pear and cherry trees. Don't forget we are in the Garden Gateway of Ontario, renowned for its horticulture, and we can see that this goes well back in time.

The houses were small. The largest described in a sale measured 20 ft. square. Most were log, seven to eight feet high. A bark roof protected them from inclement weather. However, after 1750, window panes were available at the mission store. Stoves did not exist so baking was done in the mission oven which in 1751 could bake 24 loaves of bread at one time. Meals were cooked on the hearth.

Built on 3-acre lots, the houses spread out along the river, linked by a narrow trail. They formed a "côte" (rib), as our French Canadians say. The section extending from a few acres beyond the church to the present boundary between north and south Essex was known as "Petite Côte" (little rib).

### THE CONQUEST

At the time of the conquest, there was a settlement of about 600 French colonists on the south shore. The area was under the authority of the commandant at Detroit and the law in effect, as throughout New France, was the "Coutume de Paris".

With the surrender of Montreal September 8, 1760, the forts of the west came under English control. The conquest made little change in the way of life of the south shore settlers. They were, however, required to pledge allegiance to the King of England, which they did without too much difficulty.

### THE PARISH

It was at this point that the mission became a parish for the French. Sixty heads of families sent a petition to the bishop of Quebec to obtain a parish separate from that of Ste. Anne de Detroit. They had no money to rebuild the church of 1748, which was falling into ruins, but they donated their labour. They built a chapel 60 feet by 30 feet.

At the same time Father Potier was granted permission by his superior to sell the mission farm to pay the church debts and provide himself a living for a while. The farm, cleared in 1748, had never been very productive. The store was no longer profitable; all business was done in Detroit with the English merchants.

On October 3, 1767, the mission became the parish of Notre-Dame de l'Assomption à la Pointe de Montréal du Détroit.

# AFTER THE CONQUEST

In spite of their small numbers, the settlers formed a solid colony and combined the elements essential to a viable community. About 1770, the English government allowed some sons

of pioneer families to settle between "Petite Côte" and Lake St. Clair but no land grants were made. It was only with the establishment of the Land Control Board that the lands were officially granted and former grants confirmed.

By 1765 all the Ottawas had already left their village and sold their land to the settlers at Detroit. A little later it was the Hurons' turn. The French colony grew in number and extent. In 1797, Father Marchand, who took over the parish, wrote:

"The parish is made up of only 150 inhabitants including the 12 at River Thames, 5 along the shore of Lake Erie and 4 on La Rivière aux Canards." 5

During the first 20 years after the conquest, no English settlers joined the Detroit garrison. However, some merchants followed the troops and took charge of commercial operations. As we have seen, the mission store had already disappeared in 1787. Abbé Dufaux, a missionary of the period, wrote in 1788:

"The times are indescribably hard among the inhabitants who have no outlet for their products. They are obliged to go into debt every day, and to give the little that they possess to satisfy the wishes of their creditors. They don't sell any stock because large quantities are arriving from the colonies and are sold at a wretched price. They are forced to keep theirs and often to see it perish from local disease -- another plague that is only too common at Detroit." 6

The years 1786 to 1791 were particularly bad. The harvest was almost negligible in grains as well as in market garden produce.

### THE LOYALISTS

This is what the American Revolution brought forth. The Americans who remained loyal to England were subjected to all kinds of annoyances. Their property was seized, they were required to pay fines, they were thrown in prison. England offered them asylum in her other colonies. By the thousands, they took refuge in Canada. The country was immense and offered vast uninhabited areas where the Loyalists could settle.

For southern Ontario, it marked the beginning of an accelerated development. These newcomers were able to develop the fertile lands of the back country. These anglophones in such numbers completely submerged the modest francophone community. But in spite of everything, at Notre-Dame de l'Assomption, a French way of life endured. Moreover, when the British troops pulled out of Detroit, the settlers were offered a choice between Canada and the United States. Some fifty French families came over at that point to augment the settlement on the south shore.

The American Revolution did more than bring considerable numbers of anglophones; it completely altered the situation on the Canadian side of the Detroit River. To that point, it had been merely an agricultural area dependant on Detroit. With the establishment of the border, an administrative centre had to be located on the Canadian side. The L'Assomption settlement was selected as the seat of government for the "Western District". The government purchased the Huron reserve and made plans to construct there the town of Sandwich which became the capital of the Western District for several years. A site was also laid out at the mouth of the river opposite Bois-Blanc island for construction of a fort. However, it was not until 1793 that Fort Malden was built there. The settlement it attracted, called Amherstburg, already had some twenty francophone families.

The granting of lands in the area attracted an even greater anglophone population. In 1791, when Upper Canada was created, the francophone population was only 20%. This included a certain number of craftsmen but 80% of the inhabitants were still farmers.

In 1836, a section of "Petite Côte" became the village of Windsor; another part became Lasalle. Other villages were created: in the northwest, Grand Marais, Pointe-à-la-Pêche, Tecumseh; further south, Belle River and Maidstone; to the east, Pointe-aux-Roches, Tilbury, St. Pierre and Chatham. Sandwich had 100 French families and the francophone population of the area was between 2,000 and 3,000 persons.

## SCHOOLS

Under the French regime, there was no school at L'Assomption but the children went to Ste-Anne de Détroit which was the settlers' parish church.

After the conquest, an unfortunate sequence of events delayed the establishment of schools and endangered those already existing: devastation of the Seven Years' War, lack of money, etc. So there was a whole generation almost illiterate. The clergy, following a long standing tradition, gave instruction to the brightest boys, to perpetutate their order, but girls were neglected.

However, from 1782, Father Hubert made an effort to provide education for children. He offered the Dames de la Congrégation a house and a three-acre property to maintain a school for girls. He even offered to pay their travelling expenses. After

much hesitation, they refused. That same year, Governor Haldimand offered Father Hubert lay teachers for the boys and nuns for the girls. Unfortunately, this promise was not kept. It was not until 1786 that two teachers from Quebec, Misses Adhémar and Papineau, opened a school for girls in L'Assomption parish.

After 1816, the governor of Upper Canada established communal or popular schools; this was the beginning of a public school system. At that time there appears not to have been any requirements with respect to the language of instruction. However, the first French teacher in Windsor, François Chenier, did not arrive until 1824.

The union of Upper and Lower Canada should have, under normal circumstances, brought with it the the integration of the school systems. In fact, after a vain attempt in 1841 to anglicize the Quebeckers, they succeeded in establishing distinct school systems in 1843 for Upper and Lower Canada. It does not appear that the francophones of Upper Canada were subjected to specific attempts at assimiliation. In 1845-46, Lafontaine and Baldwin had a bill passed by the Parliament of the United Canadas enshrining the principle of the church school: this was instituted in Upper Canada in 1863 with the establishment of the separate school system. This system included all Catholic schools irregardless of language.

In 1912, concerned by the increase in the francophone population, in the Windsor-Essex area as well as in the north and Ottawa area, the Ontario legislature passed the notorious Regulation XVII, which took fifteen years to be repealed. However, its repeal only guaranteed instruction in the French language in elementary schools. Secondary schools were still secular and English. And we have this regrettable paradox:

assimilation advanced at the same pace as education. Indeed, the few private French secondary schools were not sufficient to the task and moreover many parents, lacking the means, could not send their children. It was only in 1968 that Ontario allowed French public secondary schools. Nor has the implementation of this law been without conflict, witness the recent struggle in Essex County. The victory won there happily forecasts better days for French culture in that area.

### OTHER FACTORS IN ASSIMILATION

The school was not the only factor in assimilation. The area, originally essentially agricultural, has become progressively more industrialized. The arrival of large multinational interests in the auto, textile, chemical and food industries has promoted the use of English in the work force. This language of wage earning has quickly become the language of everyday usage.

The development of the media has also had an influence, since until very recent years, they promoted American and Anglo-Canadian culture.

Fortunately, there have been the Lacasses, St. Pierres, and other francophones to direct the battle for linguistic and cultural survival. For several years there has been a French newspaper in the area. A radio station established May 18, 1970, allows francophones of Essex County to hear broadcasts in their own language and since July 17, 1976, they have been able to enjoy French television.

## CONCLUSION

The francophones of this area are to a great extent descendants of French pioneer families who settled these lands two centuries ago. Their historic presence on Ontario soil allows them to consider themselves more than merely an ethnic minority among others. They can remember with pride that they were the first European occupants of this province, which substantiates their efforts to maintain their identity and ensure its recognition by those with governmental power.

### **GENEALOGY**

This collection of genealogies is unfortunately incomplete. It would have taken me years of research in parish and legal archives to include present-day generations. I have, then, chosen to stop at about 1900.

However, it may prove useful to members of the families studied who will be able to trace the lineage between themselves and the marriages recorded. I have also tried to indicate the relationship of the first settler in the area back to the original ancestor who came from France. I have found as well, wherever possible, all the known facts about the original ancestor.

After selecting 25 families from among the pioneers, I have had to abandon 6 for various reasons: imcomplete records, inaccessible parishes, lack of time. So 19 of them remain.

May the descendants of these 19 settlers find here a draft outline of their family history which they can fill in themselves.

This is how I proceeded. I assigned a number to each couple with descendants. Under this number I grouped all the married sons, giving them each a number if they had descendants.

#### **BENETEAU**

Pierre Bénéteau, son of François Bénéteau and Marie Fiolet of St-Martin de l'Ile de Ré, was a miller at St-Vallier when he married Hélène Larriné at Berthier, County of Montmagny. Two of their sons, François and André, settled at L'Assomption de la Pointe de Montréal. François, who married Françoise Gagnon at Quebec on September 8, 1767, was a saddler. He drowned in the Rivière-aux-Canards. André, a mason, married Agathe Leduc at Detroit but lived on the south shore.

### **BERGERON**

André Bergeron was born at St-Surnin-sur-Bois, in the diocese of La Rochelle about 1645. He was the son of Pierre Bergeron and Catherine Marchand. He appears again on the farm of Eustache Lambert, at Lauzon in 1667, his father Pierre with him. In 1670, André obtained a land grant at Lauzon. On July 9, 1673, he contracted a marriage with Marguerite Dumais whom he married two days later. At Lauzon he raised his family of twelve children. His eldest son André settled at St-Antoine-de-Tilly. There he married four times and raised eighteen children. Of his third marriage to Geneviève Dugay, August 22, 1719, Simon was born. He came to Detroit as a voyageur and married there Catherine Lebeau, daughter of a recipient of the land grants of 1749. He settled with his wife's family on the south shore.

#### BEZER

Jacques Bézer, or Léneille, son of André Bézer and Marie Bergeron of St-Etienne de Tours, married Catherine Metté.

### **CAMPEAU**

Etienne Campeau, a mason, was born at Brine-la-Gaillarde in Correze, in 1638. He was the son of Léonard Campeau and Françoise Maugé. He came to New France as a young man and settled at Ville-Marie. There he married Catherine Polo from La Rochelle on November 26, 1663. They had at least six boys. They were all voyageurs. Two of them, Jacques and Michel, accompanied Lamothe Cadillac. In 1707, Michel and his wife Jeanne Massé settled at Detroit. The following year Jacques and Cécile Catin did the same. They were traders and merchants. In 1710, the two families returned to Montreal. On the way, near Niagara, Mrs. Jacques Campeau gave birth to a son, Nicolas, who was always known as "Niagara". In 1714, Jacques and his family returned to Detroit. Michel died in Montreal but his wife and children came back in 1720. Several sons of Jacques and Michel left descendants in Essex County.

### CHAUVIN

When Jacques Chauvin arrived at Quebec, his wife Jeanne Gignois had already died. He was born at Malville, bishopric of Xaintes, in Saintonge in 1665. On January 16, 1699, he married Marie Couchon, widow of Michel Olivier, at

Quebec. Their son Charles was born in 1702. On October 21, 1726, he married Marie-Anne Casse or St-Aubin. In 1748, he became blacksmith for the Huron mission. His descendants in the area are many.

#### DE HETRE

Antoine DeHêtre, gunsmith, lived at "Grosse Pointe". He married Charlotte Chevalier, probably at Michilimakinac. In 1751, he moved to Detroit. He had three sons, one of whom, Louis, was a well known interpreter and married Françoise Fortier at Montreal. He established the DeHêtre family in the Montreal area.

### DROUILLARD

Simon Drouillard or Argentcour was christened in 1688 at Marennes in Saintonge. He was the son of Jean Drouillard and Jeanne Chevreau. He married Marguerite Ferret on November 25, 1698, at Quebec. He settled on the Ile d'Orléans where his son Jean-Baptiste was born on February 14, 1707. A voyageur, the latter married Elisabeth Rapin at Lachine on February 5, 1731. He made several trips to the upper country with his father; then in 1749 he obtained a land grant across the river from Detroit. Simon died at Detroit. Pierre, one of Jean-Baptiste's sons, was a well known interpreter.

#### DUFOUR

Pierre Dufour or Bonvivant set out for Detroit on April 12, 1738. The following year his wife came to join him. He was born in St-Malo in Brittany, son of Pierre-Mathieu Dufour and Anne de Larue. At Montreal, he married Charlotte Gloria on June 13, 1737. He worked at the fort for several years and in 1749 was granted land on the Canadian side. Three of his sons, Pierre, Louis and Joachim, went back to Montreal. Only one, Jean-Baptiste-Mathieu, appears to have settled in Essex County.

### DUMOUCHEL

Bernard Dumouchel was born at Rouen in 1652, son of Pierre and Marie Lebret. In 1673, he married Jeanne Jouan at Trois-Rivières. He was a shoemaker first at "Prairies Marsolet" (Champlain), then at Montreal. Two sons were born of this marriage, Bernard and Paul. Paul was the grandfather of Vital. He had married Marie-Louise Tessier. Their eldest son, Louis-Joseph, married Marie-Louise Leclerc. Louis-Joseph was a blacksmith. The latter's eldest son, Vital, was also a blacksmith. He went to practise his trade at L'Assomption de la Pointe de Montréal. It appears that only one of his sons, Pierre, settled at Sandwich. The others went back east and settled in Deux Montagnes County.

### **GIGNAC**

The Canadian forefather's name was François Jugnac. There is no record of his origin or birthplace. He was at Cap-Santé near Quebec in 1688. His wife was Anne Duclos. Their son Pierre married Brigitte Petit at Cap-Santé on January 21, 1718. Their eldest son, Joseph-Marie, married Madeleine Galarneau at Cap-Santé on January 11, 1745. From this marriage Jean-Baptiste was born; he settled at L'Assomption de la Pointe de Montréal and married Catherine Lebeau there. The Gignacs of the Windsor area are descendants of his second marriage to Charlotte Bertrand. With time the name has changed.

### **GODET or MARENTET**

The forefather of this family was Nicolas Godé who came to Montreal with Maisonneuve in 1642. He was already married and father of at least four children. They came from St-Martin d'Ige, at Perche. He was a carpenter. On October 25, 1657, he was killed by the Iroquois while working on the roof of his house. His eldest son, Nicolas, married Marguerite Picard in Montreal. They settled at Trois-Rivières. There their son Jacques married Marguerite Dugay or Marentet. It was of this marriage that Jacques was born who took the surname Marentet. At first he was a voyageur, then a merchant in Detroit. From there he crossed to the other shore where most of his descendants today bear the name Marentet. Very few have kept the original name, Godet.

### GOUYAU

Guillaume Gouyau was born at St-Surin, bishopric of Bordeaux. He was the son of Antoine Gouyau and Marguerite Mignot. He came to New France as a soldier. On January 21, 1686, he married Hélène Benoit or Livernois at Boucherville. Their eldest son Jean-Baptiste, born on October 13, 1688, at Montreal, was the voyageur who settled at Detroit in 1712 as a trader. There he married Marie Larose in 1720. In September 1743, he became resident farmer for the Jesuit Fathers at the Huron mission on Bois-Blanc Island. With time the name has become Goyau.

### **JANIS**

The Canadian forefather was François Janis, born at Argenteuil in Champagne, son of Jean Janis and Marie Paquet. He married Simone Brousseau at Trois-Rivières on November 14, 1704. Their youngest son, François-Nicolas, born on January 7, 1720, was the forefather of the Janis family of Essex County. From 1738 to 1744, François-Nicolas visited all the forts on the Great Lakes as a voyageur. Then, in 1745, he married Thérèse Meloche at Detroit and settled in the area. He worked as a mason with his father-in-law, Pierre Meloche, a building contractor.

### MELOCHE

François Meloche was born in 1674 at La Rochelle, son of François and Thérèse Hernu. He married Marie Mouflet or Champagne at Montreal on October 24, 1700. Their eldest son Pierre, born September 1, 1701, married Marie Caron at Lachine on August 16, 1729. Two years later, he went to Detroit with his family. He established a sawmill across the river from Detroit. Then he became a building contractor supplying both material and labour. Before the end of his life, he built a house on the south shore. There he died in 1760. His descendants are many in Kent and Essex counties.

### OUELLET

When Jean-Baptiste came to settle at L'Assomption in 1762, his family had already been in Canada for almost a century. His forefather, René Haelet, son of François and Elisabeth Paré, was born at St-Jacques-du-Hautpas, Paris, in 1635. In 1666, he was in Canada, since he married Anne Rivet at Quebec on March 8. His second son, Mathurin-René, married Angélique Lebel at Rivière-Ouelle on January 28, 1691. Their son, Jean-Baptiste, married Geneviève Tardif at Kamouraska. There Jean-Baptiste was born. He arrived in the Windsor area to practise his miller's trade.

#### PARENT

Michel Parent was the son of Antoine and Marguerite Lehongre of St-Jacques-de-la-Boucherie, Paris. He married Marie Benoist at Trois-Rivières on

June 30, 1692. After passing through Quebec, they settled at Montreal where Pierre and Laurent were born. After several trips to the upper country, Laurent settled at Detroit to work as a carpenter. His brother Pierre came to join him but it seems that he left no descendants.

### REAUME

René Réame was born in 1643 at La Rochelle, son of Jean Réame, master carpenter "on large contracts", and Marie Chevalier. It appears that he came to Canada at about twenty years of age as a carpenter. He married Marie Chevreau at Quebec on October 26, 1665. They had a family of 13 children. From the first generation, the name was changed to Réaume. One son, Robert, born in 1668, was the forefather of the Réaumes of the Windsor area. He was a voyageur for several years. In 1690 he contracted to be a cod fisherman in the Gaspé. Then he made several contracts to go to the upper country. In 1696 he married Elisabeth Brunet or Bellehumeur at Montreal. Two of their sons, Hyacinthe and Pierre, settled in the area, after several years as voyageurs.

### RIVEAU or LAJEUNESSE

Jean Riveau, or Lajeunesse was born at St-Jean de Grenoble, son of Claude Riveau and Marie-Anne Bondet. He came to Canada with the naval forces and was sent as part of the garrison to Detroit. After being disbanded, he obtained a land grant on the Canadian side and married Marie-Josephe Dinan or St-Etienne.

### VILLERS or ST. LOUIS

Louis Villers, born at Ruys-aux-Nonains in Lorraine, was the son of Jean and Marguerite Gratiou. He came to Detroit as a garrison soldier. There he married Marie-Josephe Morin. Disbanded in 1749, he obtained a land grant on the south shore of the Detroit River. He died there in November 1765. Most of his descendants bear the name St.Louis.
